Moyers, W.C. with Ketcham, K. (2007). *Broken: My story of addiction & redemption*. New York: Penguin. This book will be referred to as *Broken* in your calendar. ISBN 978-0-14-311245. (Paperback).

I have left a copy of the main text and three copies of *Broken* at the Reserve Section of the Library’s Circulation Desk. The bookstore sells used copies of both books.

COURSE OBJECTIVES+

As indicated in UTEP’s catalogue, the “... course provides a basic understanding of how drugs produce their behavioral effects ... and the principles by which these substances modify and regulate behavior in the brain.” In addition, you will learn about:

- 1) The definition, classification, origin, and history of psychoactive drugs;
- 2) The diagnostic criteria of drug use disorders;
- 3) The nervous system and the pharmacology of psychoactive drugs;
- 4) Stimulants: Cocaine, amphetamines, methamphetamine, caffeine, and nicotine;
- 5) Depressants: Alcohol, sedative-hypnotic, anxiolytics, inhalants, and opioids;
- 6) Hallucinogens: LSD, peyote, magic mushrooms, MDMA;
- 7) Marijuana;
- 8) Support groups and evidenced-based drug prevention and treatments;
- 9) Criminal offenders and illegal drugs;
- 10) Testimonies from individuals with substance use disorders and from family members;
- 11) The experience of attending an open meeting of a substance-abuse support group.

ATTENDANCE OF SUPPORT GROUP MEETINGS

You will be required to attend one session of an **open** meeting of either Alcoholic Anonymous or of Al-Anon. You can get a schedule and locations of the AA and Al-Anon open meetings at www.aa.org and at www.al-anon.alateen.org. You will be required to adhere to the confidentiality rules of the group you attend. Also, you will be required to write an essay about your experience of attending either group. However, you will not be allowed to take notes during the meeting nor mention specific names of individuals of such groups in your essay. Your essay is to be typed (font size 12), single-spaced, and one page long. The essay is worth a maximum of 25 points and is to be turned in **no later than Wednesday, 4/13**. No exceptions. I will provide you with more information about attendance to AA and to Al-Anon during class.

OPINION ESSAYS

I have scheduled guest speakers for the class. You will be required to write your **opinions** about each presentation. Do not write a summary of the presentation, as summaries will accrue zero points. The length of these essays is one **single-spaced** page and they will be **due one week after each presentation, during class**. No exceptions. Each opinion essay will be worth a maximum of five points. Points will be deducted if the essay is not one page long.

EXAMS

There will be four non-comprehensive tests, each consisting of 40 to 60 multiple-choice questions. Each test will be worth 100% points. Please bring an 882-E (green) Scantron. The test questions will come from my lectures, textbooks, films, the guest speakers' presentations, and from the syllabus. The tests will start promptly at 3 p.m. You will have 65 minutes for each test, with the exception of the final. After each test, I will review the exam to give you feedback on your test performance. No headwear is allowed during tests. **If you stay for the review, no cellular phones or electronic devices are allowed before or during the review.** I will keep the exams for two weeks in case you want to go over your answers.

I will not ask you to memorize dates, names of individuals, or of statistics, unless I mention them in class or unless the textbook states something like: "The most common (important) ..."; "The number one cause of ... is" This syllabus contains important information about the course, its purpose, and your responsibilities, so it is important for you to read it. There will up to five questions about the syllabus on each exam. You will be tested on the information marked with a +.

Please go to the bathroom before the exam as you will not be permitted to leave the classroom once the exam has begun. No student will be allowed to enter the classroom once a student has finished an exam and has left the classroom.

Grading of Exams

Grading for all four tests will be based on the following percentage scale:

A = 90 – 100% B = 80 – 89% C = 70 – 79% D = 60 – 69% F = 0 - 59%

Your final grade for the course will be based on a maximum of 455 points, provided none of the speakers cancel. If one guest speaker cancels, the maximum points for the course will be 450; if two speakers cancel, the maximum points will be 445; and so forth.

Your final grade will be computed as follows:

Final grade = (Ex 1 + Ex 2 + Ex 3 + Ex 4 + AA/Al-Anon essay + speakers' opinion essays)/4.55 x 100.

The final grade will be based on the following point scale:

TOURS OF LA TUNA FEDERAL PRISON AND OF DISMAS CHARITIES HALFWAY HOUSE

The tours of La Tuna and of Dismas halfway house will be on a voluntary basis. A group of inmates who are participating in the Federal Bureau of Prison's Residential Drug Abuse Program (RDAP) will give a presentation at La Tuna, and ex-inmates who completed RDAP will speak to us at Dismas. I will give more information about the tours during class. The tour of La Tuna (8500 Doniphan, Anthony, Tx.) is scheduled for Thursday, April 28, from 12 noon to 3:30 p.m. The tour of Dismas (7011 Alameda) is scheduled for Monday, May 2, from 5:30 to approximately 7:00 p.m.
