Course Description and Learning Outcomes: The probabilistic foundations of mathematical statistics. Probability spaces, random variables, univariate and multivariate probability distributions, conditional distributions, expectation, generating functions, multivariate transformations, modes of convergence, and limit theorems. This course provides an overview of foundational mathematical concepts needed to develop a sophisticated understanding of concepts required to be a data scientist. The material covered in this course may stand alone or be built upon in DS 5381.

Course Activities/Assignments: Homework assignments will be regularly assigned. There will be three midterms and one final exam.

Assessment of Course Objectives: Homework problems will be assigned but neither collected nor graded. The solution manual is made available. It is highly recommended that you do homework regularly and independently before checking out the solutions. The final grade is based on three midterms and the final exam.
