Course Description:

Portuguese 2302 is an intermediate Portuguese language course which assumes prior knowledge and some experience with Portuguese (PORT 2301). The course uses a variety of language teaching approaches to help the students achieve the mastery of all four basic language skills: listening, speaking, reading and writing. At the same time students will become familiar with some of the most important cultural traits of Brazil.

Course Objectives:

Upon successful completion of PORT 2302, students should be able to:

- Understand the main idea and most of the supporting details of spoken Brazilian Portuguese intended for college students of Portuguese on topics related to the daily life of the student and current affairs.
- Speak in complete sentences on the above-mentioned topics with sufficient accuracy in pronunciation and the use of vocabulary and grammar (present and past indicative and present subjunctive) so as to be understood by the native speaker of Portuguese.
- Read articles on cultural topics with an understanding of the main ideas and most of the supporting details.
- Write a coherent composition of several paragraphs on a familiar topic, such as those
 mentioned above, with a logical organization and sufficient accuracy in grammar,
 vocabulary and spelling so as to be understood by the native speaker of Portuguese.
- Understand significant cultural traits (lifestyles, attitudes, customs, etc.) of the Portuguese-speaking world, and function appropriately in frequently encountered social situations.

Students who earn a grade lower than 70 a must repeat the course and earn a 70 or better before they will be permitted to continue to the next level.

Students have to be on time in class with the required materials and homework for the day.

Attendance / Participation:

Students are required to show proper classroom behavior, attend all classes, and to have an active participation in class, and in all activities assigned for the course. In order to participate in class and use new Portuguese forms with the benefit of receiving feedback from your instructor and classmates, you need to attend classes regularly. Using Portuguese to interact with your instructor and your classmates is an important aspect of learning the language and cannot be measured in written exams. Therefore a portion of your final grade will depend on **class participation.**

More than four (4) <u>unexcused</u> absences will result in the loss of participation points in the final grade. Three tardies are equivalent to one absence, and therefore excessive tardiness may cause your final grade to be lowered due to absences. The instructor has the right to drop you from the class if the student misses more than 7 days of class or if he/she is constantly late.

There is NO MAKE-UP of missed class work, quizzes or oral presentations without valid documentation justifying the student's absence. Talk to your instructor about any attendance problem.

Cell phones and any other electronic devices MUST BE TURNED OFF DURING CLASS unless otherwise instructed.

Homework:

The main goal when learning a foreign language is the actual use of the language for communication purposes. This involves a great deal of practice. Therefore, students must prepare and complete **on time** all work assigned in class. This includes readings, oral presentations, compositions and other written assignments, quizzes, and online activities. Plan at least two (2) hours **daily** outside of class and several hours on the weekend to study.

Exams:

There will be two fifty-minute written exams, each with listening comprehension, grammar, reading, and composition, including questions about class presentations.

MISSED EXAMS: in general, there are no make-up exams. If, however, for reasons beyond your control, you know that you will not be able to take an exam, talk to your instructor to arrange an alternate day or time **before** the day of the test. A student who misses an exam without previously arranging for an alternate day or time must present appropriate documentation of a personal reason or medical emergency in order to avoid a zero (0) in the exam.

Oral Exams:

There will be also two (2) oral exams; the first one will be a dialogue with one or two classmate(s) where you talk about some pre-selected topics. The second one will be a dialogue/

skit, based on pre-selected topics, prepared and presented in pairs to your instructor and to the rest of the class. Students who miss the oral exams will automatically receive a grade of zero (0).

Compositions:

Students will write three (3) compositions. Topics will be assigned by the instructor. All compositions have to be TYPED (DOUBLED-SPACED, font 12). Late compositions or compositions that are not typed (doubled-spaced) will automatically receive a grade of ZERO (0). Deadlines have to be followed. **Compositions will not be accepted by email or after deadlines.**

Group Presentations:

Students will do one (1) oral presentation IN CLASS. These presentations will be prepared and presented in pairs. Topics will be chosen in consultation with the instructor. Missed presentations will receive a grade of ZERO. Students are expected to follow and take notes during their classmates' presentations. Questions about the presentations may appear on exams and / or quizzes.
