Prerequisite

Enrollment as a music major and the performance of a successful barrier jury for the voice faculty

Course Description

The study of traditional classical vocal technique and the application of that technique in the performance of vocal repertoire from various periods and styles, and in multiple languages. There may be additional studies on historical and genre-specific performance practice and critical listening skills for self-and peer assessment.

To Ensure Success in the Course

- Attend all lessons
- Rehearse weekly with your pianist
- Master technical skills through regular practice
- Accurately learn and memorize assigned repertoire
- Know the word-for-word translation of foreign language texts from memory
- Thoroughly research the composer, poet, or librettist, derivative work (opera/musical/oratorio), the character, and the historical context of your repertoire
- Combine the above elements into artistic performances commensurate with your academic level

My job is to guide, teach, and provide you with resources to develop your talent to its fullest potential.

Your job is to commit fully to the development of your instrument and the learning of your repertoire. Your active and committed participation in this collaboration will be critical to your success.

Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes

As a result of our collaboration, you will perform your assigned repertoire from memory in studio classes, area recitals, juries, and other performances with...

correct pitches and rhythms	<i>leading toward</i>	<i>basic</i> proficiency as a musician

for Commercial Music Majors

Semesters 1-3	5-8 selections from a variety of commercial genres	Any
Semester 4	Senior Recital composed of 16 selections from a variety of commercial repertoire. Must contain music composed or arranged by the student and extensive use of instrumentation other than piano or guitar	Any

Student Responsibilities

- Attend all scheduled lessons.
- Audio or video record all lessons.
- Review the recording of each lesson, taking note of assigned vocalises, corrections made in music, etc.
- Practice and study for 1–2 hours daily to master vocal exercises assigned in lessons and to master the assigned repertoire.
- Total practice per week: 7–9 hours. Not all practice is singing!
- Perform at least twice on Voice Area Recital.
- Attend weekly studio classes and perform at least twice.
- Perform at least 3 pieces of the semester's repertoire from memory on a mid-term exam lesson.
- Perform a jury for the voice faculty at the end of the semester. This is the final exam for the course and will be graded based on criteria found in the Voice Area Handbook.

For all assigned repertoire

- Learn and memorize assigned repertoire (songs) with accurate pitches, rhythm, diction, appropriate style with level-appropriate technical skill, and musical and dramatic expression.
- Create a journal containing:
 - Written research on the composers, poets or lyricists, and historical period
 - A three-line word-for-word translation (not poetic) with accompanying IPA symbols (example attached).
 - Any other journaling you create concerning the piece, (i.e., character study, thoughts about your learning process, notes from your lesson recordings, etc.)
- In your music, write the word-for-word (not poetic) translation of the text and the IPA transcription above or below the original text.
- In Microsoft Word, create a side-by-side translation document, following this procedure: (example attached)
 - Create a two or three-column table with multiple rows.
 - Input each line of the original text with all diacritical markings in a separate cell of column one.
 - Input the corresponding literal (not poetic) line-by-line English translation for each line into the cells in column two.
 - If you are also translating into Spanish, input the corresponding Spanish word-for-word translation (not poetic) for each line in the cells in column three.
 - Save a separate document for each song.
 - This will be for use in memorizing poetry, its translation into your first language, and in degree recital programs.
- Study several recordings performed by recognized professionals in the genre of each piece using sources such as YouTube, Spotify, etc.

For repertoire from a musical or an opera, also:

- Obtain and read a synopsis of the complete work.
- Research the character and understand who he/she is in the context of the work.
- Research the scene to which the piece belongs.

For pop, jazz, or rock repertoire, also:

- Study several recordings, arrangements, and remakes of the song, using sources such as YouTube, Spotify, etc.

Materials and Personal Equipment

- Copies of your music either in a three-ring binder or on a tablet large enough for you to read
- Research Journal (composition notebook)
- Audio or Video recording device (iPhone or similar okay)
- A copy of the International Phonetic Alphabet pronunciation guide for English, Spanish, Italian, French and German
- Access to the Internet and Blackboard

Accompanists

You are expected to retain the services of a qualified pianist at your own expense to play for the second half of each voice lesson. You are also expected to rehearse with your pianist for one half hour each week. Thus, you will have a one-hour commitment per week with your pianist.

Grading

Grades are based on the following criteria:

30%: Weekly lesson grades

- Attendance (see attendance policy below)
- Arrival with your voice in teachable condition
- Active Participation in the lesson
- Completion of assignments (i.e., text translations and IPA work)

30%: Evidence of weekly practice

- Mastery of assigned exercises and concepts
- Preparation of assigned repertoire and ability to sing it with accompaniment

20%: Mid-term exam

- Sing 3 pieces of assigned repertoire from memory with accompaniment in the lesson the week of October 16)

20%: Jury grade

- Average of the grades assigned by the Voice Area faculty.

Course Communication

We will primarily communicate with each other by email, using our UTEP email addresses. It is your responsibility to check your UTEP email at least twice per day. I will try to reply within 24 hours and I ask you to reply to me likewise. If time is of the essence, you may send me a text message.

Attendance Policy

Students are required to attend 14 one-hour (50-minute) lessons scheduled at the beginning of the semester and constitute a class that meets once per week at the same time.

Absences

- Students are permitted one absence per semester without a grade penalty. More than one absence, no matter the reason, will reflect poorly on your grade.

Lateness

- The student forfeits the lesson if they arrive more than 10 minutes late for a 25-minute lesson or more than 15 minutes late for a 50-minute lesson.

Lesson Cancellation Policy

- Notify Mr. Downen by email or text message, but no later than 9:00 a.m. on the day of your lesson.

Make-up Lesson Policy

- Lessons missed by Mr. Downen will be made up.
- Lessons missed or canceled by the student will be made up at the discretion of Mr. Downen. However, lessons canceled by the student that are made up, will not negate the absence policy.

Drop Policy

If you feel that you are unable to complete the course successfully, please let me know and then contact the Office of Registration and Records to initiate the drop process. If you do not, you are at risk of receiving an “F” for the course.

Incomplete Grade Policy

An incomplete may be requested only in exceptional circumstances after you have completed at least half of the course requirements. Speak with me immediately if you believe an incomplete is warranted. If granted, we will establish a contract of work to be completed with deadlines.

Concert Attendance

- Students are expected to attend all choral music concerts and one performance of each Opera UTEP production.
- Students are expected to attend all voice recitals.

Area and Departmental Recital Attendance Policy

1. All students enrolled in Individual Instruction: MUSA 1195, MUSA 3295, and MUSA 3391, must attend a minimum of twelve (12) Area and Departmental recitals scheduled every Friday at 1:30 p.m., in the Department of Music.
 - a. **Failing to attend twelve (12) required recitals will lower the student’s final Individual Instruction grade by one letter.**
 - b. Students are responsible for signing in at each recital electronically. Students arriving late, or leaving early may have their attendance voided.
2. When a single area recital is canceled, students must either attend a different area recital held at the same time or attend a makeup event (see makeup procedures, below).

Recital Makeup Procedures

Students may make up Area and Departmental recital absences by attending UTEP Music Department concerts and recitals. Non-university concerts such as El Paso Opera, El Paso Symphony, El Paso Wind Symphony, and El Paso Pro-Musica, as well as any other performances given by our faculty and guests, will be accepted.

1. To receive credit for UTEP Music events with *electronic programs*, the student must complete the online **recital makeup form**, available by hyperlink within the electronic program.
2. To receive credit for events with physical *paper programs*, the student’s program must be **signed at the conclusion of the event by a music faculty member in attendance.**
3. The student must submit the signed program with their name and ID number clearly written on the front page to the Music Office (M301). The student must also **sign the makeup log**. Without this information, the student will not receive credit. There will be no exceptions.
4. The deadline to turn in signed programs **to the Music Office is Friday of finals week at 5:00 p.m.** There will be no exceptions.
5. Students are responsible for knowing how many recitals they have or have not received credit for attending. Students may check their recital attendance by visiting the Music Office.

Vocal Health

Effective practice is very important to progress toward your vocal and performance potential. However, excessive practice or singing more than two hours per day can be counterproductive and dangerous to your vocal health. Listen to your body. Give yourself appropriate rest periods. Hydrate, do not smoke, avoid overuse of caffeine and alcohol, get adequate sleep, stay healthy, and do not abuse your voice (i.e., talking over loud environments, yelling at sporting events or concerts, etc.).
