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Course Description:

What is an academic study of Judaism? Judaism has been described as a religion, a race, a nation, and a culture. These descriptions offer different presentations of Judaism, but how do they help us better understand Judaism? The academic study of Judaism allows us to investigate these kinds of descriptions to better understand what they contribute to our understanding of Judaism. An academic approach also allows us to think beyond those ideas by questioning how concepts like religion, race, nationhood, and culture are helpful for understanding Judaism: *Is Judaism a religion, a race, a nation, a culture? Or is Judaism much more than these descriptions offer?* This sort of investigation allows us to deal with Judaism as a unique complexity of religion, history, philosophy, and more. The goal of this course is to introduce students to the academic study of Judaism and to its value as a field of study.

Course Policies:

Modules – Modules will be provided on Blackboard at midnight on the first day of its scheduled availability (page 5). Each module will include lecture slides, assignment submission links, and any other materials that accompany the lesson. The information provided in the modules and slides are provided to help clarify the purpose of the assigned readings and to help guide students through the ideas presented. *Students are ultimately responsible for keeping up with all assigned readings and should not rely solely on the information provided in the modules to complete assignments.* Any cases of academic dishonesty will be documented and reported to the appropriate authority.

Course Assignments and Requirements:

Discussion Boards:

Students will be responsible for participating in *four* discussion boards worth 8.75% each to count for a total of 35% of the final grade. Each discussion board will detail the necessary requirements for full credit and must be submitted by the scheduled deadline. The purpose of this assignment is to see that students understand the ideas presented in the assigned readings and can substantially contribute to an academic discussion about those ideas with their peers. Late submissions will only be eligible for half-credit and cannot be submitted once this deadline has passed.

Quizzes:

Students will be responsible for completing *four* quizzes worth 8.75% each to count for a total of 35% of the final grade. Each quiz will cover the assigned readings listed for a module and must be completed by the scheduled deadline. The purpose of this assignment is to see that students are keeping up with the assigned readings and can answer questions about the ideas presented in the readings. Late submissions will only be eligible for half-credit and cannot be submitted once this deadline has passed.

Final Exam:

Students will be responsible for completing a final exam on **Monday, July 8th, 2024**, which will count for 30% of the final grade. The exam will be comprehensive and consist of multiple-choice questions. The exam will become available in the module on the scheduled day beginning at midnight and will be due by 11:59 p.m. MST. Late submissions will only be eligible for half-credit and cannot be submitted once this deadline has passed.
