Course description:	Each intern will be placed at an individually arranged practicum site at a community/public health agency under the supervision of a qualified mentor who will provide guidance towards the completion of an approved public health practicum project. A minimum of 160 hours of field experience is required. Interns are required to attend 8 in-person classes for professional development throughout the semester. Professional development for public health education will also include the requirement of attending 3 scheduled training sessions aside from the class room classes to become certified public health education diabetes trainers.
Course pre-requisites:	HSCI 4313 w/C or better and passing of required background check and clinical compliance. HSCI GPA of 2.7 or better and departmental approval.
Required textbooks:	Additional readings will be provided via BlackBorad.
Course format:	On-site learning experiences in a public health or social service agency, in-class learning activities, oral and written presentations.

Course/Instructor & Institutional Policies	
Incomplete policy:	An "I" (incomplete grade) can only be considered only <u>if requested by the student in advance of the conclusion of the course</u> and only for <u>legitimate, documented</u> emergencies. Failure to request and negotiate the terms of an "Incomplete" grade before the conclusion of the course will result in a denial except in the most extraordinary circumstances. Student must have a "C" or better grade standing upon request of an incomplete and must have more than ½ of the required assignments completed.
Attendance:	It is UTEP policy that all students attend all scheduled classes. Attendance will be taken at each class.
