Prerequisites: A minimum grade of 'C' in MUST 2314 (Music Theory IV) *and* MUST 2112 (Aural Skills IV), and a passing score on the upper-level Music Theory and Aural Skills Advancement Exam

COURSE DESCRIPTION

- MUST 3211 is an upper-level course in 16th-century counterpoint. The focus of study will be the musical style of Palestrina, though the works of other Renaissance-era composers will be considered. Through written exercises and analysis, students will gain an understanding of the compositional style of the Renaissance era. It is intended for theory/composition majors but may be taken by all upper-level music students.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- understand and explain the principles of melodic, harmonic, and contrapuntal organization of the musical style of Palestrina and other Renaissance-era composers.
- apply the understanding of 16th-century musical style in writing short compositions that are consistent with the stylistic features of polyphonic Renaissance-era music.

COURSE OUTLINE

- *Class Participation.* Active involvement is very important in this class. Class meetings will involve a discussion, analysis, and singing of exercises and representative compositions. Students are expected to contribute regularly to these discussions.
- *Homework.* Progressive exercises in two- and three-part writing will be assigned regularly. Other assignments may include the analysis of representative 16th-century compositions. Unless otherwise noted, assignments are to be turned in at the *beginning* of the class period on the due date. Assignments turned in after this time will be considered late. **No credit will be awarded for late**

assignments unless documentation of an excused absence is provided or unless arrangements have been made **prior** to class.

- *Composition Project.* As the culmination of the study of species counterpoint and free writing, students will complete a composition for three voices using a short traditional Latin text.
- *Exams.* There will be no exams in this class. During the final exam time for this class, we will analyze and sing through completed projects.

GRADING

Grades will be calculated based on homework and the composition project. Each component will be calculated as a percentage score (for example, if you earn 180 out of a possible 215 points on the homework assignments, your percentage score for that component would be $180/215 * 100 = 83.7\%$). These scores will be weighted according to the following outline in determining your final grade. A sample semester grade calculation is provided below.

Homework	60%	90% and above A
Composition Project	40%	80% up to 90% B

For students with final scores within 1% of the next grade level (59%, 69%, 79%, 89%), the instructor may assign a higher grade if the student has (1) attended class regularly, (2) not missed homework, quizzes, and exams, (3) demonstrated *consistent* effort in mastering class material, and (4) shown improvement throughout the semester.

SAMPLE SEMESTER GRADE CALCULATION

Homework: 180 out of 215 total points earned = 83.7%

Composition Project: 92 out of 100 total points earned = 92.0%

Final Grade: $.60*83.7 + .40*92.0 = 87.0 = B$
