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## Course Description

As part of the Entering Student Experience, UNIV 1301 supports students as they build a foundation for academic excellence, personal growth and professional success. Students will explore and embrace the knowledge, strengths and values they bring to the university. They will engage in introspection and self-reflection to validate their identities, experiences and aspirations. Students will learn to navigate UTEP, become familiar with campus resources and work to develop skills that will help them succeed in other university courses.

## Learning Objectives

### Identity Learning Objectives

- Students will explore their identities as learners and the relationship between their values, beliefs, and educational goals.
- Students will **reflect** on their unique strengths, talents, and skills and consider how they can utilize them to succeed in their academic and professional pursuits.

### Agency Learning Objectives

- Students will **reflect** on and develop their sense of personal agency to take ownership of their education.
- Students will acquire the knowledge, skills, and strategies needed to navigate the university and succeed in college.
- Students will enhance their communication, teamwork, and leadership skills through participation in meaningful activities.

### Belonging Learning Objective

- Students will **reflect** on what it means to belong and the importance of belonging to their college experience.

- Students will cultivate a sense of belonging and begin building networks of support in their campus communities.

### Aspiration Learning Objectives

- Students will clarify their academic and professional goals and begin developing a plan to accomplish them.
- Students will envision a post-college future and **reflect** on the legacy they wish to leave at UTEP and in their communities.

### The UTEP Edge

The UTEP Edge is our philosophy that acknowledges the many assets our students bring to the University. We provide a variety of high-impact experiences both in and out of the classroom through work of our faculty, staff, alumni, and community partners that build on these assets and talents. Many of the assignments and discussions in this class will further develop the talents you bring to this class such as developing your communication skills, teamwork, critical thinking, and problem solving.

1. Integrate asset-based approaches into pedagogical practices, curricular and co-curricular programs, and advising

4. Embed professional preparation and readiness in curricular and co-curricular activities

### Common Read

*This I Believe: The Personal Philosophies of Remarkable Men and Women* by Jay Allison will be our common read. You will be graded on participation and assignments. We will have

four check ins with a total of two readings per check in.

### Becoming a Miner Autoethnography

Throughout the semester, you will participate in various course, campus, and community activities that will help shape your entering student experience at UTEP. You will document these experiences in a Becoming a Miner Autoethnography. The autoethnography is worth 400 points.

### Participation

Participation will be based on the activities we do in class. Attendance is very important to get the participation points.

**When possible, assignments in this course are graded pass/fail.** To earn a “pass,” your assignment must 1) be completed in full and 2) meet minimum standards for college-level work.
