Course Description

As part of the Entering Student Experience, UNIV 1301 supports students as they build a foundation for academic excellence, personal growth and professional success. - Students will acquire the knowledge, skills, and strategies needed to navigate the university and succeed in college.
- Students will enhance their communication, teamwork, and leadership skills through participation in meaningful activities.

Belonging Learning Objective

- Students will **reflect** on what it means to belong and the importance of belonging to their college experience.
- Students will cultivate a sense of belonging and begin building networks of support in their campus communities.

Aspiration Learning Objectives

- Students will clarify their academic and professional goals and begin developing a plan to accomplish them.
- Students will envision a post-college future and **reflect** on the legacy they wish to leave at UTEP and in their communities.

The UTEP Edge

Becoming a Miner Autoethnography
