## **Course Objectives**

The course on concepts in materials science and engineering provides fundamental understanding of the four classes of engineering materials, metals, polymers, ceramics, and composite materials with particular focus on process-structure-property relationship. The emphasis will be on concepts that enable us to obtain superior mechanical properties.
