Course Overview & Objectives

This class is about the constructions of deviance and deviant behavior. Definitions of deviance will be discussed along with societal reactions to deviance and deviants. This class will consider various forms of deviant behavior such as alcohol and drug use, crime, sexual and physical deviance and theories that attempt to make sense of deviance in our society. By the end of the semester, students will understand the deviant structures of society. In addition, students will have learned to integrate two major areas of study in sociology: deviance and criminology. Learning about society through a sociological lens, students will also develop an increased understanding for all persons.

Class Structure, Important Announcements, and Participation

You are responsible for keeping up with the assigned readings and being prepared for class discussions. The textbook readings are intended to provide background information to my lectures. Because I like to have class discussions when I am lecturing, it is of utmost importance that you read the assigned reading for that particular lecture in the textbook. If for some reason, due to the class discussion, I am unable to lecture on a particular topic in the textbook you are still responsible for knowing that particular section of the assigned reading. So please be aware that you will be tested on what the textbook covers as well as my lectures. The readings will be from the textbook listed above, as well as any other material that I may handout during the semester. I will not be posting my lecture slides online.

Simple Rules for Class Behavior

PLEASE BE IN CLASS ON TIME! Class starts at 9:20 AM. If you are unable to make it to class at 9:20AM during this semester because of work or other commitments, I recommend you drop this class. Given the rather specialized subject matter of the course, however, those who do attend class regularly will be more likely to understand the material and will therefore be in a better position to do well in the class. If you miss class, please obtain the lecture notes from one of your fellow classmates. I will not provide you with copies of my notes.

Grading

Your grade in this class will be based on 4 exams and 4 written assignments. Make-up exams may only be acceptable under extreme circumstances, such as a medical or personal emergency. I must warn you, however, that I base these decisions on a very narrow definition of extreme. The student must provide me with proper documentation to qualify for a make-up (documentation does not, unfortunately, guarantee that a make-up will be given). Final decision is left to the discretion of the professor and all makeup exams must be scheduled within one week of the original exam. Missed exams will be assigned a grade of zero (0). You are responsible for bringing a Scantron and a #2 pencil to each exam. Exams will cover material from lectures, textbook, and any other material discussed in class.
