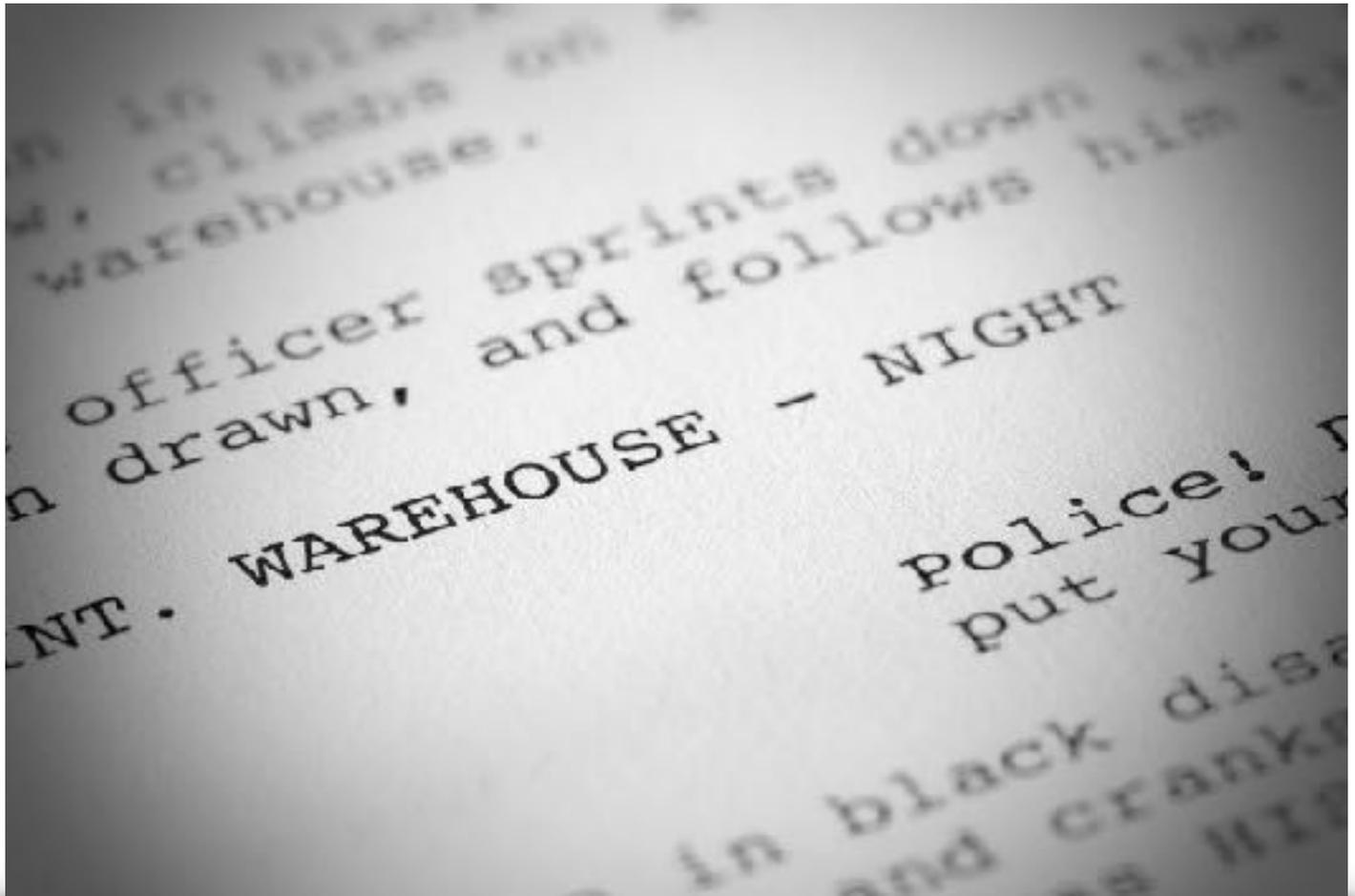


SCREENWRITING

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to the practice of writing dramatic narratives for the screen. The emphasis will be practical rather than theoretical, focusing on the elements and principles of sound cinematic writing and geared toward establishing a solid technique. The bulk of the coursework will be generating original material, in the form of weekly exercises and a couple of longer creative assignments, and responding to classmates' work.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- To learn how the basic elements of a screenplay are used.
- To build a strong understanding of the core principles of dramatic storytelling, specifically as they apply to writing for the screen.
- To develop optimal methods of communication with peers and collaborators.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- The ability to format a script according to current industry standards.
- Facility with the craft of screenwriting sufficient to compose a script that is technically proficient and has considerable artistic merit.
- The confidence to deliver verbal feedback on the work of colleagues in a way that is meaningful, constructive, and conducive to further collaboration.

*I have posted a number of screenplays on Blackboard; in addition, many screenplays are available for free on-line. Making a regular habit of reading scripts will help you become familiar with the form.

Software: You should have access to software that is designed specifically for script formatting. There are a number of good screenwriting programs out there, each with its own bells and whistles. While Final Draft is the industry standard, there are numerous less expensive options, the most popular being Celtx. Celtx has a free version available on-line; while the functionality is limited, it should be sufficient to get you through this course. You can find a list of free screenwriting software programs on Blackboard, under Course Materials and Links.

COMMUNICATION

ASSIGNMENTS & GRADING

Portfolio (45%)

You will submit a total of 12 exercises over the course of the semester, each related to that week's lesson. These assignments will be submitted on-line prior to each week's class and will serve as the material for that week's in-class readings and responses. Carefully review the submission instructions and the terms of each assignment.

You will upload your script to that week's folder on Microsoft OneDrive. Once you have done so, it will be available to be viewed by everyone in the class. Bring an electronic device to class in order to pull up that week's submitted scripts.

At the end of the semester, you will compile all of your work and submit it as a portfolio through Blackboard.

Since these exercises are vital to work we are doing in class, late submissions will not be accepted. **Please bear in mind that these assignments will be shared with small groups, and some will be shared with the whole class, so make sure you submit work that you are comfortable sharing and discussing.**

Attendance/Work Responses (20%)

At the BEGINNING of each class period, we will divide into small groups to discuss that week's completed exercise. You will read and discuss each group member's completed assignment. This is the primary way you will be sharing your work and getting direct feedback, and enthusiastic participation and a spirit of collaboration and support are critical to getting the most out of these exercises.

Final Script (35%)

At the end of the semester, you will submit a 10- to 20-page script for a short film. Note that you will have submitted a treatment for this script as well as sample pages prior to the due date; you will be evaluated on the whole progression from treatment to submitted draft.
