Course PHAR 6170-004: Public Health for Pharmacists

Course Faculty

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Office Hours

Office hours are by appointment only. The course coordinator will accommodate students as time permits. Students may request an appointment with the coordinator in person or via e-mail at least 48 business hours in advance. The course coordinator is available to address questions or concerns regarding grading. Individual faculty lecturers should not be contacted unless the faculty lecturer or course coordinator has given permission to do so

Course Description

This elective introduces pharmacy students to the foundations of public health and the essential role pharmacists play in promoting and protecting community health. Through readings, videos, and real-world examples, students will explore core public health concepts, historical developments, and current pharmacy-led initiatives in prevention, education, and health equity. Designed to be flexible and engaging, this course highlights how pharmacy practice connects with broader public health goals at the local, national, and global levels.

Pharmacists' Patient Care Process: This course supports the PPCP by emphasizing how public health principles, such as population health, disease prevention, and health promotion, integrate with pharmacist-led care. Students will explore how assessment, prevention, and education at the community level complement the PPCP steps of collecting information, assessing needs, developing plans, implementing interventions, and following up. By understanding the broader context of public health, students can more effectively apply the PPCP not only to individuals but also to populations.

Course Learning Objectives

At the conclusion of this course, students shall be expected to:

1. Define public health and explain how it differs from clinical practice.
 2. Describe key historical developments and societal influences that have shaped modern public health systems.
 3. Identify the roles of pharmacists in public health, including prevention, education, and health promotion.
 4. Apply public health concepts such as population health, social determinants, and epidemiology to pharmacy practice.
 5. Recognize opportunities to align pharmacy services with public health goals and the PPCP.
 6. Reflect on the evolving role of pharmacy in enhancing health outcomes at both individual and community levels, including understanding health hazards and the methodologies and types of data generated by public health studies.
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Detailed Course Meetings & Locations

Online Platform/Blackboard:

Accessing Course Content on Blackboard: All course material will be located in Blackboard. Log into My.UTEP.edu and click on the Blackboard link to access PHAR-6170. The course is individualized and students may access material as it is made available by each course instructor.

Online Assessment Requirements:

All assessments will be administered via ExamSoft®, unless noted otherwise. You must install and maintain a current version of ExamSoft's application on any laptop that will be used during an exam. It is the student's responsibility to maintain access to a reliable internet connection (with the rare exception of when UTEP's systems are down).

Expectations of Students During the Course

Time commitment: Taking courses online enables you to attend graduate school while continuing to work and fulfill other responsibilities in your life. In order for you to be successful in your studies, it is essential that you plan your schedule to include 2-3 hours per week of school work for every credit in which you are enrolled. While the times of day and specific days of the week in which you do this work are flexible, in order for you to be successful in your classes and to fulfill your responsibilities as a member of your class learning community, you must participate actively and regularly in online discussions. This means setting aside specific time in your schedule every few days, each week.

Methods of Instruction/Learning

Student learning will be assessed weekly through a combination of short quizzes, discussions, and brief written assignments. Each module is designed with specific learning outcomes that align with the module's topic. By completing these activities, students will demonstrate their understanding of public

health principles, the evolving role of pharmacy, and their ability to apply these concepts to real-world contexts.

It is the responsibility of the student to monitor his/her progress during the course. Students should seek advice and assistance from the course facilitator as soon as he/she encounters any difficulty in the course.

Required Course Technology/Tools/Needs

Course content is delivered via the Internet through the Blackboard learning management system. Ensure your UTEP e-mail account is working and that you have access to the Web and a stable web browser. Google Chrome and Mozilla Firefox are the best browsers for Blackboard; other browsers may cause complications. When having technical difficulties, update your browser, clear your cache, or try switching to another browser.

You will need to have access to a computer/laptop, a webcam, and a microphone. You will need to download or update the following software: Microsoft Office, Adobe Acrobat Reader, Windows Media Player, QuickTime, and Java. Check that your computer hardware and software are up-to-date and able to access all parts of the course.

If you do not have a word-processing software, you can download Word and other Microsoft Office programs (including Excel, PowerPoint, Outlook and more) for free via UTEP's Microsoft Office Portal. Evaluation and Grading Policy

This course is designed to be flexible and manageable alongside your other responsibilities. There are no exams or long papers. Instead, your grade will be based on weekly module activities that help you engage with the material in practical, low-stress ways.

Each of the 12 modules includes a short task. This might be a quick quiz, a discussion post and replies, or a short-written reflection. These activities are meant to encourage learning, not add pressure.

All modules are weighed equally, and together they make up your final grade.

12 modules 100% (~ 8.33 % each)

Missed Exams Policy

The course coordinator MUST be notified on the day of the exam for the student to be excused from that exam. Do not assume you can miss an exam for vacation or other personal conflicts. Any unexcused absence from an exam will result in a grade of zero for that exam. Any excused absence from an exam for health reasons must be documented with a note from an appropriate health professional. A make-up exam will be given within 5 business days of the students returning to school. The make-up exam may involve oral or written questions. Failure to take the make-up exam will result in a grade of zero for that exam. Failure to take the final exam will result in a grade of F for the course.

Technical Assistance

Checking computer requirements and ensuring that all software is up to date is essential for students to access course content. **Supported browsers include:** 1) For a PC: Firefox, Internet Explorer (Do NOT use IE7), and Chrome, 2) For a Mac: Safari, Firefox, and Chrome. To enhance browser performance, students should clear the browser cache and allow pop-ups. In addition to testing the web browser, check to ensure that the computer has an updated version of Java (go to <http://java.com>, click on “Do I have Java”, click on “Verify Java Version,” update Java if needed). Additional browser plug-ins may also be needed to view some content that your instructor may share on the learning management system. Common plug-ins include Adobe Reader, Flash Player, Windows Media Player, and QuickTime. When creating documents, slide presentations, spreadsheets, etc., be sure to use Microsoft Office or a compatible program (see 10 Free MS Word Alternatives). The UTEP Technology Support Services (3rd floor, UTEP Library) can also provide students with applications, compatibility packs, patches, and updates that may be needed.

Students working off campus may need to set up a Virtual Private Network (VPN) on their computer to access UTEP resources for this class (i.e., Library).
