COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to and survey of dance forms, choreography, notation, dance history, dance criticism, and the role of dance in the visual and performing arts and within societies.

Classes will typically be conducted in two modules per week, with one module consisting of lecture, discussion of assigned readings, and a visual exploration of the week's topic; and the second module consisting of a movement-based exploration of the week's topic.

The modules will typically follow the format of lecture Tuesday and workshop on Thursday, but may change depending on the availability of special guest workshop presenters.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

To witness, explore, and experience a broad range of dance forms and dance related subject matter with the goal of deepening the student's knowledge of dance and its relationship to the visual and performing arts and within societies.

The students will:

- Discuss readings related to a broad range of dance topics
- Participate in workshops wherein they will experience movement vocabularies belonging to a broad range of dance forms
- Relate, compare, and contrast thematic, aesthetic, and practical commonalities and differences within a broad range of dance forms
- Observe, describe, and analyze live and filmed presentations of dance in a within a theatrical/performance-based setting.

REQUIREMENTS:

ATTENDANCE: Students are expected to attend all classes; however a maximum of 2 classes may be missed without penalty, as per the Attendance First Absence Policy. Attendance will be taken at 1:35 PM. You must declare yourself present. Those arriving between 5-10 minutes late will lose ½ of a participation point. Those arriving more than 10 minutes late will be counted as absent. Those who miss more than two classes within the semester will see their overall grade drop by ½ letter grade each additional day late.

Dance does not live in a vacuum. Dance is a vibrant, living cultural artifact. As such, our discussions will include sensitive topics such as race, ethnicity, gender, and sexual orientation. I value your voice. Please value the voices of your peers in this classroom. I will not tolerate discourse that is derogatory, defamatory, or violent towards any group or individual.

<u>PERFORMANCE REVIEW</u>: Students must attend TWO dance performances over the course of the semester, and write a **500 word critical analysis** <u>cited in APA Format</u> for each dance performance observed.

Students are <u>required</u> to attend <u>ONE OF THREE</u> PERFORMANCES HELD BY UTEP's Department of Theatre and Dance. Your choices are as follows:

- New Voices In Dance; Wise Family Theatre; November 13 (Open Dress Rehearsal),

- Tommy; UTEP Dinner Theatre; October 11-27
- A Christmas Carol en la Frontera; Wise Family Theatre; December 5-8

IF YOU ARE PLANNING ON SEEING A CHRISTMAS CAROL, YOU MUST GIVE YOURSELF ENOUGH TIME TO WRITE YOUR PERFORMANCE REVIEW. Tickets sell out fast for this performance. Be prepared.

Get your tickets early at the Wise Family Theatre box office.

- The Wise Family Theatre box office is located on the second floor of the Fox Fine Arts building.
- You may also purchase tickets through Ticketmaster.
- Tickets for the performance of *Tommy* may be purchased through Ticketmaster and at the UTEP Ticket Center. Tickets go on sale September 10th.

The second performance is at your discretion. The Borderland dance community is vibrant, and there are plenty of opportunities to observe professional and pre-professional dance. Performance review opportunities will be posted on Blackboard.

FILM REVIEW: DUE FRIDAY. NOVEMBER 29 @ 11:59PM

Students will choose a dance film to observe and write a **1,000 word critical analysis** <u>cited in APA Format</u>. The film must be in the canon of "Musical Theatre" (think: *Oklahoma!*, *West Side Story*, *In the Heights* or even Bollywood/ Egyptian/ Lebanese Musical Theatre). They cannot be a movie like *Dirty Dancing*, *Step Up*, or *Strictly Ballroom*. **You must submit your** <u>film choice</u> to me by Friday, November **15** at **11:59pm**.

Students MUST have their work checked by the UTEP University Writing Center, and staple the receipt from the University Writing Center along with a ticket stub, program, or online receipt to their paper. If you have not been to the writing center, I will not accept your paper.

FINAL REFLECTION: DUE WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 11 @ 6:45PM

En lieu of a Final Exam, you will be given a prompt on Blackboard and asked to write a 500 word final reflection <u>cited in APA Format</u>. THERE IS NO LATE WORK ACCEPTED FOR THIS ASSIGNMENT. _____

ATTENDANCE FIRST/LATENESS/PARTICIPATION POLICY:

"ATTENDANCE FIRST" ABSENCE POLICY

To succeed in any course, but especially a dance course where students can often only learn by experiential participation, a student must first and above all be present. Therefore, the Attendance First Absence Policy of the UTEP Dance Program prioritizes class attendance and participation at the top of the grading process.

<u>TECHNIQUE/THEORY/CREATIVE CLASSES THAT MEET TWICE OR THREE TIMES A</u> <u>WEEK.</u>

In a course that meets twice a week, a student is allowed a maximum of 4 absences in an entire semester, 2 of which require no justification and result in no penalty. A student may use these absences based on personal necessity. The 3^{rd} and 4th absences will result in a drop of ½ letter each in the student's overall grade. At the 5^{th} absence, regardless of the student's current course standing or grade, the student automatically fails the course.

For courses that meet three times a week, the allowance is 3 absences without penalty. The course grade is reduced by $\frac{1}{2}$ letter each for the 4^{th} , 5^{th} , and 6^{th} absence, and the student automatically fails at the 7^{th} absence.

TECHNIQUE CLASSES MEETING 4 AND 5 TIMES A WEEK.

For courses that meet four and five times a week, the maximum allowance for an entire semester is 8 absences. Five result in no penalty and require no justification. The 6^{th} , 7^{th} , and 8^{th} absences result in the lowering of the overall course grade by ½ letter. At the 9^{th} absence, the student fails the course regardless of course average.

EXCEPTIONS:

- In the event of international bridge closures, exceptions may be made and make-up course work assigned.
- In case of an injury or extended illness, it is the student's responsibility to meet with his or her instructor to discuss possible solutions for course continuation or to consider dropping the class.
- In the event of highly unusual or extenuating circumstances, a student may petition the course instructor and department chair for permission to continue in a course.
