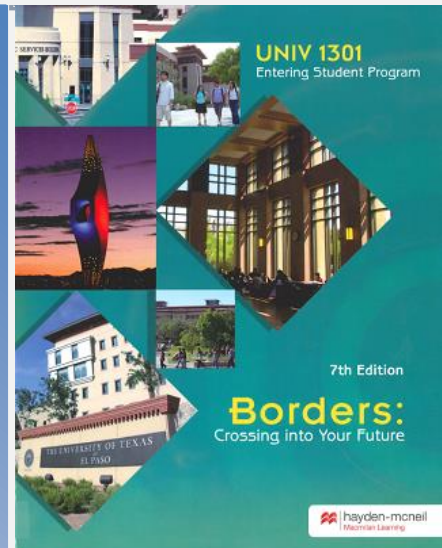

Course Description

Students will learn how to critically analyze the representation of social issues in American popular culture. They will gain a deeper understanding of the use of rhetoric, audience awareness, and subject matter knowledge. Students will learn to strengthen their academic performance by exploring their future career paths and by developing research, critical thinking, writing techniques, and public speaking skills.

At the end of this semester, students will have achieved the following goals:

- ✓ Develop and apply elements of leadership through effective individual participation and meaningful team collaboration
- ✓ Examine the roles and responsibilities crucial for their success in college and beyond
- ✓ Identify, assess, and build on their strengths and experiences to develop academic and transitional strategies necessary for success in their academic, career, and life goals
- ✓ Engage in research and critical thinking activities that demonstrate their ability to effectively integrate their learning within, across, and beyond academic settings
- ✓ Engage in campus and community activities to increase their sense of academic and social belonging

Participation Clause: This is a discussion/workshop class, not a lecture class. Therefore, you must attend each class period to participate in the discussions, group projects, and in-class activities. Class Policies

Late Work: A reduction of 10 points will be applied to any work submitted after the time of collection and up to one calendar day late. Work submitted more than one calendar day after the due date will not receive credit. Quizzes/tests cannot be made up. If you are going to miss class, you may submit your work ahead of time via e-mail. The time-stamp on the email must be before class starts or it will be subject to the late work policy. This policy applies to both university-sanctioned absences and personal absences. No exceptions.

Attendance: You are allowed three absences without penalty. Your final grade will be penalized by one letter grade for each additional absence. A student with more than three absences is subject to being dropped from UNIV 1301 at the instructor's discretion. Three (3) tardies and/or early departures will result in one absence.

Cell Phones/Texting: Cell phone usage (texting, apps, web browsing, etc) is unacceptable. You will be asked to leave. Please make sure your cell phones are on silent and put away.

Civility: Any successful learning experience requires mutual respect on behalf of the student and the instructor. You are expected to treat your classmates, peer leader, instructor, and guests with respect; the same will be afforded to you.

Course Assignments

Daily Work (40%): Homework, *Borders* assignments, academic advising assignments, quizzes, extra-curricular activity, etc. Daily work is assigned in class and will usually be due as noted in class and/or on the syllabus. Daily homework assignments will not be listed on Blackboard. Arrive to class on time and with your completed homework assignments. If you are late to class, so is your homework and it will be subject to the Late Work Policy.

E-Mail Response Journal (10%): You will check your UTEP e-mail address and write a response journal to one (1) email received that week. Not every week will have an ERJ, so be sure to review the course calendar.

Participation (10%): You are expected to engage in discussions, activities, workshops, assignments, and instructor/peer leader meetings. Your attendance and completion of the Entering Student Program End of Semester survey also factor into this grade. More information provided in class.

Research Paper (15%): You will select a social issue affecting the community and write a short research paper. More information provided in class.

Pop Culture Analysis Project (15%): You will look for common themes surrounding your social issue and identify them in various elements of popular culture. This assignment will have elements of leadership and a heavy research component to it. You will utilize credible sources to help support your argument. More information provided in class.

Final Exam (10%): You will complete a final exam due during Final Exam Week. More information provided in class during week sixteen.

Grade Dispute: Grade disputes will be discussed during posted office hours, not before/during/after class.

Note that the grade listed on Blackboard is NOT your current grade in UNIV 1301. The grade listed on Blackboard is only a partial Daily Work grade, worth 40% of your final grade. To request a current grade, send me an email. I am happy to provide it.

Extra Credit

Academic Success Skills Workshops

The Entering Student Program (UNIV 1301) hosts a series of success skills workshops that include time management, active reading, note taking, avoiding plagiarism, exam preparation, and tackling tough final projects. You can attend up to seven different sessions for 10 points extra credit each to be added to your daily work average (70 points max). The ASSWs can be counted as an extra-curricular activity, but will not double-count as extra credit.

The Entering Student Program (UNIV 1301) puts on a showcase of student work the Saturday after Dead Day from 1:00-4:00pm in the TRCC (Union East). Extra credit will be applied to your final exam.

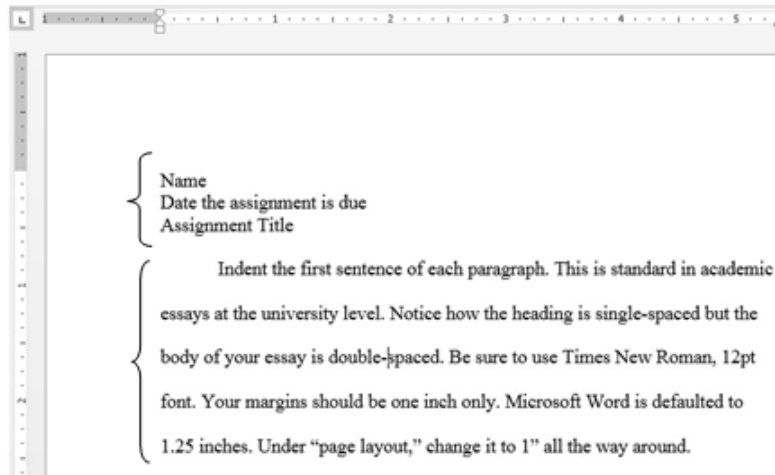
