**Course Objectives:** This course is designed so that you will have an understanding of the following learning outcomes at the completion of the course.

- Demonstrate an understanding of the language of Biology.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the basic concepts of inorganic, organic and biochemistry as they apply to the biological sciences.
- Demonstrate the ability to predict the roles of atoms, molecules, organelles, genetics and environmental factors in regulating metabolism of prokaryotes, animals and plant cells.

**Assessment of Course Objectives:** A learning outcomes evaluation (self-assessment) will be handed out for you to complete at the same time that the course evaluation forms are completed.

**Exams:** There will be four exams throughout the semester followed by a comprehensive final exam. You will be allowed to drop your lowest exam score not including the final. Thus, only your three best exam scores plus the final exam score will be calculated into your final grade.

**Grading:** The regular exams (3) are worth 75% of your final grade. The final exam is worth 25% of your final grade. Grading scale: A=90-100%; B=80-89%; C=70-79%; D=60-69%; F is <60%.
