8-Week Course: June 8 to July 31, 2020

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Please note: Unforeseen circumstances may necessitate modifications to the course calendar. Any changes will be announced with reasonable notice to students.

Course Description: A general course designed to provide the student with an understanding of Mexican American culture and society. This interdisciplinary course explores how ethnic Mexicans in the United States have created a distinct culture. To better understand the Mexican American experience, this survey examines the history of Mexico. Furthermore, issues such as immigration, community formation, nativity, class, and gender are also probed to increase our awareness of the experiences of Mexican Americans.

Course Objectives:

The following are objectives of this course:

1. To increase understanding of the Mexican American experience from a broad and inter-disciplinary perspective.
2. To develop independent and critical thinking.

3. To increase skills in communication.
4. To promote cultural understanding.
5. To foster the integration of perspectives.
6. To increase knowledge of Mexican Americans by drawing from the historical perspective, research findings, and methodology of various disciplines.

Required Materials:

- Access to computer and Internet
- All readings and videos for the class are posted on the **Blackboard** site and are located inside of the Learning Module for any particular week.

The Blackboard course shell contains all materials related to this course. You will also use Blackboard to send e-mails to your fellow classmates or to me – always remember to include an appropriate subject line to prevent your email from going into the junk mail folder. **All correspondence for this class must be done through Blackboard email.**

***** IMPORTANT:** You must get into the habit of checking Blackboard **EVERY DAY** to make sure you do not miss any important announcements.

Our Virtual Classroom:

All communication must be conducted through Blackboard email. Please do not send emails to my UTEP address. If you email me be sure to include as much information as possible to include your first and last name, title of class, and CRN number. I will respond to you within 24 hours.

NOTE: I will be checking my Blackboard email regularly Monday - Friday between 8:00 AM – 5:00 PM Mountain Time (MT). I do not respond to email on Saturdays or Sundays, except in cases of emergencies..

Required Software:

You definitely need Adobe Acrobat Reader to access the lectures and readings for the class, as they are all (.pdf) files. If you do not have Adobe Reader on your computer you can download the program for free by going to <https://get.adobe.com/reader/otherversions/> and follow the instructions to install the reader.

You are also required to have a media player plug-in to view the assigned videos for this class. The most common plug-ins are Adobe Flash Player, Windows Media Player, QuickTime Player VLC Player. You can get a free media player plug-in by going to <https://get.adobe.com/flashplayer/> and following the download instructions. If you use Google Chrome as your browser then the Adobe Flash Player is already built in.

When creating documents, slide presentations, spreadsheets, etc., you must use Microsoft Office or a compatible program. Microsoft Office is available at the UTEP bookstore to students at a discounted price. If you cannot purchase it you can access it at any of the computer labs on campus. Be sure you have the appropriate word processing software because if I cannot open your documents, they will not be graded.

Deadline for assignments and quizzes is 11:59 PM (MT) on the due date; CHECK COURSE CALENDAR for all due dates and deadlines as late submissions will not be graded. Please ensure that you carefully read the *Course Calendar* and all instructions. It is your responsibility to meet all class requirements.

Learning Modules:

The class consists of five (5) Learning Modules. An Introduction and Getting Started module, three (3) theme related modules, and a Final Exam module. In each

Learning Module you will find a short Introduction; a Lecture, which deals with the topic at hand; all Readings and Videos; Quiz links; Assignment links; and Discussion Board links. Each Learning Module will last approximately twelve (12) days.

The embedded Quiz, Assignment, and Discussion links will open according to the scheduled due dates and deadlines. See Course Calendar for all due dates and deadlines. Remember: You will not see a Quiz, Assignment, and/or Discussion link until the day that they are scheduled on the Course Calendar.

Quizzes: There will be four reading quizzes, one in each of the first four Learning Modules. There is no quiz during the week of the Final Exam. The quizzes will be located inside of the individual Learning Modules. Check course calendar for scheduled dates and deadlines for all quizzes.

Individual Assignments:

You will submit three (3) assignments. You will submit three (3) Critical Response Papers for Learning Modules 2, 3 and 4. I will provide a set of guidelines on “How to Write a Critical Response Paper” as well as a set of questions to guide your analysis. Check course calendar for assignment due dates and deadlines.

Group Discussion Boards:

You will work in groups of five to six. Random groups will be generated the second week of class. These are permanent groups and no changes will be permitted. There will be three (3) *Group Discussion Boards* associated with Learning Modules 2, 3, and 4, and participation in the group boards ***is required***. You will find your Group Discussion Board Links

embedded in the opening page of Learning Modules 2, 3, and 4. Check course calendar for Group Discussion Board deadlines and due dates.

The grades will be divided as follows:

4 Quizzes: lowest quiz grade will be dropped (3 quizzes, each worth 100 points)

Individual Responses Papers: (3 papers, each worth 100 points.)

Discussion Boards: (3 discussions, each worth 100 points.)

Final Exam: 100 points.

-  **Course Policies and Procedures**



CLASS POLICIES:

1. You must check Blackboard daily for announcements and emails. If you fail to check Blackboard and you miss an important announcement or email you are responsible for the consequences.
2. You are provided with a separate Course Calendar that clearly defines all due dates and deadlines. Online learning is independent learning and you must be responsible enough to submit all work on time. I will not accept late work.
3. The only time that I will accept a late quiz or assignment is if the Blackboard System goes down. I have the ability to enter the system as both an

administrator and as a student and I will know if there was a system failure. If there is a failure Blackboard provides me with a report stating so and then I can extend the deadline.

4. Your work schedule, military deployment, athletic events, travel, vacations, sick children, broken computer, lack of access to internet, etc. are not valid excuses for missing any work in this online course.

5. **This is an upper division course and you will be penalized for poor writing skills.** If you submit work that is riddled with spelling, grammar, and punctuation errors you will lose a significant number of points for that assignment. This could be the difference between a passing and failing grade so I strongly suggest that you utilize the spell check before submitting.

6. All modules and links are time released. This means that you will see modules and links on the dates that they are scheduled to open according to the Course Calendar. For example, if you have a quiz that opens on Thursday at 5:00 PM (MT) you will not see the quiz link until that Thursday at 5pm and the link will disappear promptly at 11:59 PM (MT) the following Friday. If you start the quiz at 11:50 PM on Friday the link will close at 11:59 PM and you will not receive credit for any unanswered questions. Again, I have the ability to track you in Blackboard so I will be able to see what time you opened any and all links.

7. Do not wait until the last minute to do your work. Technology has a way of tripping you up when you are racing against the clock.

8. If you are working from home you must ensure that you have all of the necessary software and that your browsers and software are up to date. If you do not have proper working equipment you will not be successful in an online class. You are responsible for seeing that all of your equipment and software are up to date or that you get yourself to a lab, library, etc. where you can meet the requirements of the class.

9. Blackboard works best with Google Chrome, and then Mozilla Firefox and Safari. Stay away from Internet Explorer! For some reason Blackboard does not communicate well with Internet Explorer so avoid it. Additionally, it is very important that your Adobe Reader and Java software be up to date. All of your readings, lectures, and assignment sheets are (.pdf) files and require the latest version of Adobe Reader.

10. It is very important that you follow directions carefully. You must submit all of your work correctly. If you fail to properly submit your work you will not receive credit for the assignment. Here is an example of improperly submitting work: Student opens assignment link, copies/pastes their critical response then fails to click the **submit button**. They then move into another part of Blackboard and the assignment is never submitted. Simple human error, but it will cost you a grade.

CLASS PROCEDURES:

Your **Learning Modules** will open Saturdays at 8:00 AM (MT). In the Learning Modules you will find a brief Introduction, the Lecture, Readings, Video(s), Quiz links, Assignment links, Discussion Board links, and any other pertinent information. Check the course calendar for all assigned readings and videos.

Quizzes:

Your quizzes are worth 100 points each. You have four (4) quizzes scheduled (see Course Calendar for quiz dates). They will be based on your readings and videos and they will consist of multiple choice, true/false, and/or short essay. They may be a combination of all three and are intended to assess your ability to keep up with the course materials. **Quizzes will be available on Thursdays at 5:00pm (MT) until Friday at 11:59pm (MT).** See Course Calendar for scheduled quizzes.

Your very first quiz is based on the *Syllabus, Course Policies and Procedures and Grading Rubric*, and the *Plagiarism* video. Be sure that you read the material and view the video thoroughly and carefully.

Individual Response Papers:

Individual Response Paper and Group Discussion Posts are due on Mondays by 11:59 PM (MT), see Course Calendar for assignment due dates. Type a 500-word (min.) critical response to the articles and videos assigned for each Learning Module. A critical response is not a summary of your readings and videos. A critical response makes important links between the sources and compares and contrasts the arguments being made by the author(s). I have placed a guideline for writing a critical response on the *Home Page* under the tab *Course Resources*.

Grading Rubric for Individual Response Assignments:

Each Individual Response paper is worth 100 points. Grading is based on the following: You will receive 0-85 points for your critical analysis. This is based on how well you understood the material and your ability to think critically about what you have just read and viewed. The remaining 15 points is based on your writing skills and this includes grammar, punctuation, and spelling. If you are having problems forming your critical analysis think about the following:

- What is the author's thesis (main argument) of the article? What is the main point of the video? DO NOT write a summary or personal opinion piece. **Analyze the material!**
- Do you agree or disagree with the author's/video's viewpoints? Why? Briefly explain and provide examples from one or both to support the stance you took.
- What are the conflicting viewpoints on this issue? Compare and Contrast the week's materials
- Can you identify further research directions for this topic?
- Can you make links, connections with either historical or contemporary events and/or examples that contribute to your analysis of the topic at hand?

Again, **I do not want a *summary* (recap of the material) of the readings/videos.** I have read and seen the material; I know what it is about.

Type up your individual response in a Word document (**SAVE the file**) and **upload your response under the Assignment Link located in the Learning Module.** Read and follow instructions in Assignment Link very carefully!!! They may change from week to week. If you

do not upload your assignment correctly you will not receive credit for the assignment.

After you submit your individual response as an assignment, copy/paste your response to your group Discussion Board Link. Your **Group Discussion Board** Links are located in the Learning Module.

Group Discussion Boards are in effect from the moment you post your first response until Friday evening at 11:59 PM (MT). Your grade is dependent on your active participation throughout the week as well as on the quality of your post.

You should check the Discussion Boards often so that you can actively participate and earn the maximum grade.

Grading Rubric for Discussion Boards:

Each Discussion Board is worth **100 points** and is graded as follows:

Posting before or by the deadline on **Monday at 11:59 PM (MT)** is worth **50 points.** You will lose 10 points for each day that you are late. (i.e. if you post your blog on Tuesday morning you will receive 40 points).

Discussion Boards are in effect from the moment that you post your blog and they run through Friday at midnight. You are expected to maintain your discussion board over this period and this means **posting daily** at your convenience. The remaining **50 points** are based on the quality and quantity of your ongoing discussion posts throughout the week.

The following is an approximate breakdown of how the posts are graded, assuming that the posts are quality and consist of critical analysis and contribute to the discussion:

1-2 posts	+5 points
3-4 posts	+15 points
5-6 posts	+25 points
7-9 posts	+35 points
10 plus posts	+50 points

EXAMPLE: You post your initial response on time so you automatically earn 50 points. Then, you post 4 more times over the remainder of discussion week and that is worth +15 points according to the rubric above; therefore, you will earn a total of 65 points as a discussion grade for that particular discussion board.

BEWARE: Simply responding to a blog with “I agree” or “wow that’s interesting” is not considered quality. Neither is responding 20 times without any substance. You can provide 6+ quality posts and receive a very good score, but remember the word “quality” carries a lot of weight!

Additionally, if you post your response to the discussion board on time but disappear from the boards until Friday afternoon and then try to post 8 times you will not receive a passing grade! A passing discussion grade consists of discussion that begins once you post your individual response to the board and continues **DAILY AT YOUR CONVENIENCE** all the way through Friday.

Final Exam:

Final exam is comprehensive and will cover Learning Modules 2, 3, and 4. The final exam is scheduled for Wednesday, July 29, 2020, opening at 5:00 PM (MT) and closing on Friday, July 31, 2020, at 11:59 PM (MT). The final exam is worth 100 points.
