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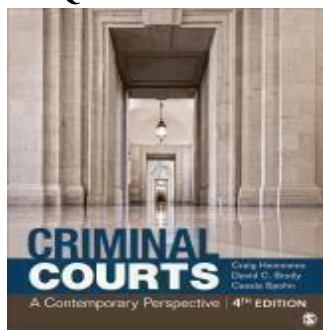

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

After completion of the course students will be able to identify, understand, articulate and apply the following concepts and models:

- a. The foundation of the American legal criminal justice system, i.e. the American Constitution, Common Law, and, case law;
- b. The three-level court system in the United States federal form of government;
- c. The players and their roles in the courts and criminal justice system, i.e. judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys, defendants and victims;
- d. The court process, to include arrest; plea bargaining and guilty pleas; the jury and the trial; sentencing, appeals, and habeas corpus; and,
- e. Current issues and the future of the US court system.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Students will be required to read each chapter, participate in discussions and be ready to discuss current events in the field criminal justice.

Exams: A total of four testing assessments will be administered to measure the students learning success. There are two quizzes, a midterm and a final exam, (total 400 points). **All quizzes, midterm and final exam will be available on Thursday and will close on Saturday of that specific week. Please plan accordingly.**

Arrangements for make-up exams will need to be approved by Professor Lozano by telephone call only.

Research Paper: Students are required to complete a research paper on a court case that has made an impact in the court system. This can be at the state or federal level. I recommend looking at news articles to get you started.

The paper must be at least **five (5) pages** and written in the third person. **NO abstract** is needed. The paper must be formatted pursuant to the APA style as delineated in the Publication of the APA Manual, Seventh edition. This paper will be supported by at least **three (3) scholarly, academic, or professional references**. The cover and reference page are NOT counted toward the 5-page minimum.

Wikipedia is not an acceptable independent academic source for written assignments. Wikipedia, however, can be used as a portal to gain a general understanding about the subject matter, but it cannot be listed as a source on research-based papers. The same is applicable to YouTube, Dictionary.com, Cliffnotes.com, Answers.com, Encarta Encyclopedia and other similar sources. The Internet may be used to access information from scholarly journals, libraries, etc. Google Scholar is an excellent research database for scholarly and professional materials. No late papers will be accepted. Early submissions are accepted and highly encouraged.

WEEKLY DISCUSSION PARTICIPATION:

For full participation credit during participation weeks, you are required to contribute a total of six (6) substantive messages each week and on three different days. You are required to answer the initial discussion question posted by the professor and respond five (5) times to other students. **Total of six (6) posts per week.** The initial discussion question will be posted on Monday @ 6:00am and will close on Saturday @ 11:00pm. The six posts must occur on at least three (3) different days during the online week to earn full credit.

NETIQUETTE:
