

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

After completion of the course students will be able to:

- Describe how corrections is part of the larger CJ system that is dependent on decisions made earlier in the process by the police and courts.
- Compare and Contrast both diversion and post-sentencing options, and institutional and community-based corrections.
- Name and describe the five primary punishment philosophies.
- Identify the various types of sentences and explain the problems of comparing them in terms of severity.
- Explain the two basis sentencing structures used in the United States.
- Describe how probation supervision works.
- Explain the two types of pretrial release.
- Explain how prisoners are classified and assigned in prison.
- Describe the characteristic of prisoners in state and federal prison.
- Summarize the issues regarding sex offenders.
- Explain the legal provision for capital punishment in the United States.
- Explain the development of the juvenile justice system.
- Explain evidence-based practices in corrections.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Students will be required to read each chapter, participate in discussions and be ready to discuss current events in the field criminal justice.

Exams: A total of four testing assessments will be administered to measure the students learning success. There are two quizzes, a midterm and a final exam, (total 400 points). All quizzes, and midterm will be available on Thursday and will close on Saturday of that specific week. Please plan accordingly. I will NOT reopen quizzes or midterm.

The final exam will be available for one week please plan accordingly. I will NOT reopen the final exam.

Arrangements for make-up exams will need to be approved by professor Lozano by telephone call only.

Research Paper: Students are required to complete a research paper regarding one of the following topics:

- Geriatric Prisons (Ex: Should we house the aging or release on parole?)
- Prison Privatization
- Women in Prison
- Gangs and Prisons
- Capital Punishment (Ex: Is it cruel and unusual?)

The paper must be at least five (5) pages and written in the third person. The paper must be formatted pursuant to the APA style as delineated in the Publication of the APA Manual, Sixth edition. Consistent with the APA style, individual paper will be typed, double-spaced, "Time New Roman" font face, 12-point font size, and 1-inch margins all around.

The paper should include a title page, an abstract and running heads. Pages should be numbered consecutively, including title page. This paper will be supported by at least three (3) scholarly, academic, or professional references. Wikipedia is not an acceptable independent academic source for written assignments. Wikipedia, however, can be used as a portal to gain a general understanding about the subject matter, but it cannot be listed as a source on research-based papers. The same is applicable to YouTube, Dictionary.com, Cliffnotes.com, Answers.com, Encarta Encyclopedia and other similar sources. The Internet may be used to access information from scholarly journals, libraries, etc. Google Scholar is an excellent research database for scholarly and professional materials.

No late papers will be accepted. Please plan accordingly. Early submissions are accepted and highly encouraged.

DISCUSSION PARTICIPATION:

For full participation credit during participation weeks, you are required to contribute a total of **six (6) substantive messages each week** in the classroom on **three different days**. You are required to answer the initial discussion question posted by the professor and respond five (5) times to other students. Total of six (6) posts per week.

The initial discussion question will be posted on Sunday @ 6:00am and will close on Saturday @11:00pm. The six messages must occur on at least three (3) different days during the online week to earn full credit.

NETIQUETTE:
