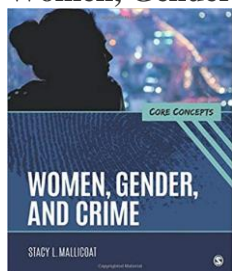

- B. Identify how the pathways towards criminal offending differ for men and women.
- C. Understand the how victimization of women contributes to female criminality.
- D. Recognize the disparate experiences of male and female professionals working in the criminal justice field.
- E. Identify the role of patriarchal societies in defining the nature of female criminal offending, victimization, and treatment of female criminals and professionals in the criminal justice system.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Students will be required to read each chapter, participate in discussions and be ready to discuss current events in the field criminal justice.

Exams: A total of three testing assessments will be administered to measure the students learning success. Students will be assessed via a quiz, a midterm, and a final exam, (total 250 points). **The quiz, and midterm will be available on BB on Thursday and will close on Saturday of that specific week. Please plan accordingly. I will NOT reopen the quiz or midterm. The final exam will be available for one week please plan accordingly. I will NOT reopen the final exam.**

Arrangements for make-up exams will need to be approved by Professor Lozano by telephone call only.

Research Paper: Students are required to produce a research paper on a topic within the field of Women, Gender and Crime, broadly defined. Students choose their own topic based upon their academic and intellectual interests. It is the responsibility of the student to conduct their own research and write their paper independently. Students will produce a paper of approximately 10-12 pages (double-spaced, 12 font, Times New Roman). The requirements are exclusive of title page, abstract, annotation/footnotes and references. Students must follow APA style (7th edition).

Wikipedia is not an acceptable independent academic source for written assignments. Wikipedia, however, can be used as a portal to gain a general understanding about the subject matter, but it cannot be listed as a source on research-based papers. The same is applicable to YouTube, Dictionary.com, Cliffnotes.com, Answers.com, Encarta Encyclopedia and other similar sources. The Internet may be used to access information from scholarly journals, libraries, etc. Google Scholar is an excellent research database for scholarly and professional materials. **No late papers will be accepted.** Please plan accordingly. **Early submissions are accepted and highly encouraged.**

DISCUSSION PARTICIPATION:

For full participation credit during participation weeks, you are required to contribute a total of six (6) substantive messages each week in the classroom on three different days. You are required to answer the **initial discussion question** posted by the professor and **respond five (5) times to other students**. Total of six (6) posts per week. The initial discussion question will be posted on Sunday @ 6:00am and will close on Saturday @ 11:00pm. The six posts must occur on at **least three (3)** different days during the online week to earn full credit.

NETIQUETTE:

You must maintain an academic attitude and uphold UTEP policies. Being disrespectful, using profanity or unprofessional behavior will not be tolerated. All of your online communications must be composed with fairness, honesty and tact.
