TEMA DEL CURSO:

RSRC 4033 es un curso sin crédito para estudiantes de pregrado que quieren meterse en el mundo de investigación a través de un proceso de aprendizaje guiado individualmente por un profesor (*mentorship*). - 3) Estudiar teorías de una variedad de campos de estudio (literatura, historia, sociología, psicología, filosofía, etc.) sobre la construcción del espacio social.
- 4) Leer y resumir artículos relacionados con estos temas.
