Course Description

MUSL 1324 is an elective music course that requires little or no background in music and focuses on the history and development of western music in the classical tradition.

Course Objectives

- To learn how to listen to, describe, and discuss music in the Western classical tradition.
- To learn how to describe music with proper vocabulary.
- To discover some of the infinite variety of styles and genres in this classical music.
- To discern some of the ways in which music and culture are intimately connected.
- To develop writing, analytical, and critical thinking skills.

Attendance

Excused absences include documented illness, deaths in the family and other documented crises, call to active military duty or jury duty, religious holy days, and official University activities. Class Attendance Policy in a Nutshell

- Go to class! Don't be late!
- It is your responsibility every day to mark yourself present through the iClicker system. If you do not have an iClicker account, create one at join.iclicker.com . The **iClicker code** that you will use to mark yourself present for this course during the semester is: **LV4R8**. Be on-time and in the classroom when you check in. If you check-in after 12:05pm you will be marked tardy or absent depending on the time you arrive.
- **After the second unexcused absence** your semester grade will be dropped 2%. Each tardy will be considered 1/2 absence.
- No make-ups will be given unless the instructor is notified in advance or provided with a note documenting the absence.

Examinations and Grading

Your grade will be based on your performance on quizzes that you will take after each class, two concert reports that you will submit through Blackboard, and examinations. Each component will be calculated as a percentage score. These scores will be weighted according to the following outline in determining your final grade.

Quizzes – 20%
Tests – 40% (10% each)
Final examination – 20%
Concert reports – 20% (10% each)

Technology requirements

All examinations and assignments will be taken and submitted through the Blackboard learning management system. The Norton e-book website material will also be linked through Blackboard. You need to have access to a computer/laptop for the coursework and a functioning webcam/microphone option for office hours, if needed. Also, you will need to **bring a fully charged laptop with headphones** if you plan to take the tests in the classroom. Be sure to download or update the following software: Microsoft Office, Adobe Acrobat Reader, Windows Media Player, QuickTime, and Java. Check that your computer hardware and software are up-to-date and able to access all parts of the course. Ensure your UTEP e-mail account is working and that you have access to the Web and a stable web browser. Google Chrome and Mozilla Firefox are the best browsers for Blackboard; other browsers may cause complications. When having technical difficulties, update your browser, clear your cache, or try switching to another browser. If you do not have a word-processing software, you can download Word and other Microsoft Office programs (including Excel, PowerPoint, Outlook and more) for

Quizzes

To prepare for the quizzes you must attend the lectures, do the readings, and practice with the interactive quizzes based on the reading and listening provided with the e-book access. This tool allows you to prepare taking practice quizzes an unlimited number of times to learn and train yourself on the material on each chapter. You will complete a quiz on Blackboard after each class, so you will need a laptop or desktop computer to do it. For Monday classes, the quiz will be available after class from 1:30pm until Tuesday at 11:30pm, and for Wednesday classes from 1:30pm until Thursday at 11:30pm. **Once you open the quiz, you must complete it.** You will have 5 minutes to do it and after that time it will close automatically. **DO NOT TAKE QUIZZES OR TESTS ON A CELL PHONE.** The Blackboard application will not work properly.

InQuizitive

It is a tool to prepare for your tests and quizzes, and check that you have mastered the concepts in each unit. It comes with your book and is linked to Blackboard. Once you have registered and entered your code, you will have access to the electronic resources, that include the E-book, playlists, and InQuizitive. Go to the course home page on Blackboard and on the left side menu click on Course Materials to access these resources.

Tests

The textbook is divided into five units. After completing each unit, you will take a test on that unit. There will be four tests during the semester. Refer to the tentative calendar for dates and be sure to mark all in your calendar. On test days, you will only have the class time to complete the exam. You have the option to come to the classroom and bring your laptop to take the exam or take it at your own location. **Tests will open at 12:00pm and it will close at 1:20pm.** **Failure to complete the exam at the indicated time will result in a grade of zero** for that exam.

Final Examination

The final exam will include more questions on unit five, the last one in the textbook, but will be comprehensive and include questions from all units. Keep your notes, outlines, flashcards, etc., all materials that you use to prepare for tests and quizzes organized throughout the semester, so it is easier to review the main concepts of those units for the final exam. There will be a final review on the last day of classes. The final exam is scheduled to be on **Friday Dec 9, 1:00-3:45pm.** Be sure to enter this date in your calendar. **Failure to submit the final exam will**

result in failing the class. For this exam, as the other tests, you will have the option to take it in the classroom using your laptop and headphones or take it at your own location.

Couse Drop Policy

If you feel that you are unable to complete the course successfully, please send me an email to let me know and then contact the [Registrar's Office](#) to initiate the drop process. Failure to do so will result on receiving an "F" for the course. The deadline to drop the course is Oct 28.

Concert reports

One of the objectives in this course is to learn to appreciate and describe Western classical music. To develop these skills, you will write two concert reports during the semester. You will be required to attend concerts/recitals; at least one of them should be presented in campus. Choose a concert to attend and write the report from the options below:

- Faculty, students, UTEP ensembles or guest artists recitals and concerts in the UTEP Music Department. These recitals will be held at the Fox Fine Arts Recital Hall (on campus). You can check the website for upcoming concerts: <https://www.utep.edu/liberalarts/music/events/index.html>. These concerts may or may not be free. You need to check or contact the department for specifics. Usually there are student discounted prices.
- El Paso Pro-Musica Concerts (EPPM). These concerts can be also found in the previous website listed as EPPM and will have a cost.
- El Paso Symphony Orchestra. These concerts are held at the Plaza Theater in downtown El Paso. If choose to go to the symphony, decide from the following dates: Sep 22 & 23 Van Cliburn Gold Medalist, and/or Oct 21 & 22 Spellbound. Check <https://www.epso.org/> for the prices and availability of those concerts.

Choose the concerts/recitals you will attend ahead of time. Save your programs and tickets as you will have to submit both with your essay, as proof that you attended the concert. Refer to the document posted on the Blackboard course home page '[Concert Report Guidelines](#)' before you write and submit your concert reports.
