Course description	Core course focuses on the analysis, interpretation, and presentation of public health data. Overview of measurement methods, descriptive statistics, confidence intervals and bivariate hypothesis testing using t-tests, Chi-Square test analysis of variance and multiple comparisons, correlation and their non-parametric test equivalents.

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Learning Objectives	<p>Upon completion of this course the student will learn the appropriate use of statistical methods for the analysis of data, with continuous and categorical responses, using statistical analysis software SPSS Statistics. These objectives should contribute to student's ability to critically review the public health and epidemiologic literature, and to carry out statistical analyses. Students will learn to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. identify sources of health-related data and statistics including population data, research data, and survey data from agencies 2. read and interpret summary tables and graphs from published public health manuscripts and/or reports 3. select the appropriate statistical methods and describe assumptions for descriptive statistics and bivariate tests 4. utilize appropriate statistical techniques for hypothesis testing 5. demonstrate technical skills needed to view, summarize, and analyze data using SPSS output 6. utilize biostatistical terminology in written and oral interpretations of statistical test results 7. develop written and oral presentation of a complete descriptive and bivariate statistical analyses
