### Course description

This course in keyboard musicianship is the third of a four-semester track of piano class. The course focuses on the development and improvement of keyboard skills such as repertoire, technique, music reading, improvisation, harmonization, score reading, and transposition, and includes technology assignments such as sequencing, recording etc. The course is intended to reinforce students' understanding of both written and aural skills theoretical concepts.

### Course goals

To provide the students with basic knowledge of keyboard skills, applied harmony, and the used of keyboard technology. These skills are essentials for the development of the student as musicians and educators.

### Course objectives

The student will be able to:

- Technical skills: movement over the entire keyboard, sound production, syncopated pedaling, arpeggios, double notes, contracting articulations.
- All major and harmonic minor scales. Two octaves, hands together
- Chords: triads and inversions in all major and minor keys, seventh chords and inversions.
- Four-part ensembles, band and choral reading including transposing instruments.
- Creating and playing two-hand accompaniment.
- Harmonize melodies using the harmonic structures studied in these chapters, with and without chord symbols provided (Roman numerals and letter symbols).
- Improvise simple melodies on a given harmonic progression and scale (major, minor, pentatonic, whole-tone, blues, chromatic, modes); and improvise different styles of accompaniments (block chords, arpeggios, Alberti bass, waltz, etc) on the harmonic structures studied in the course
- Perform solo and ensemble repertoire from a variety of styles and periods.
- Sight read.
- Transpose.
- (Multi track recording and sequencing)

## Attendance

- Attendance is required and will be taken at the beginning of each class meeting. .
- Absences: you are allowed to have 3 unexcused absences during the semester. Your grade will be dropped 3% points for every unexcused absence beyond the 3 allowed.
- Each tardy will be considered 1/2 absence
