## The Borderland and the Environment

### Course Description

This university seminar course will lead the incoming freshman to learn about, analyze and research various topics related to the history and current status of the air, soil and water quality along the US-Mexico border area, focusing primarily on El Paso/Cd. Juarez. This course will emphasize critical thinking, research and writing strategies and effective written and oral communication whilst immersing students in opportunities for a successful university transition including: student success strategies, effective career and advising guidance, and participation in community and college events.

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### Course Goals

- Students will develop and apply elements of leadership through effective individual participation and meaningful team collaboration to empower them to be agents of change.
- Students will examine the roles and responsibilities crucial for their success in college and beyond.
- Students will identify, assess, and build on their strengths and experiences to develop academic and transitional strategies necessary for success in their academic, career, and life goals.
- Students will engage in research and critical thinking activities that demonstrate their ability to effectively integrate their learning within, across, and beyond academic settings.
- Students will engage in campus and community activities to increase their sense of academic and social belonging.

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- Students will learn about and practice essential study skills needed to be successful in a university.
- Students will learn skills necessary to research an academic theme, prepare and conduct a presentation with their peers.
- Students will establish contacts with professors, university staff and other classmates to create a positive environment and support group.
- Students will learn to assess and understand more about their own interests, abilities and values in order to realize their academic, career and life goals.
- Students will become involved in activities related to UTEP and also learn about the resources available to them through their campus.

## Evaluation

The grading criteria for this course will consist of daily grades, Blackboard Journal Posts, class participation and professionalism in the classroom, a career portfolio, a final research presentation, annotated bibliography, a community involvement project and a final reflection essay. Please see below for descriptions of each.

- **Daily grades (chapter quizzes, oral presentations, attendance to at least one university-related event, and other daily class assignments and activities): 400 points (25 points each)**
  - Description of daily grades:
    - Chapter quizzes: online quizzes over chapters and readings assigned for the week on the *Borders* book (10 quizzes worth 25 points each)
    - Oral presentation: over campus resources: (25 points)
    - Degree Evaluation Assignment: (25 points)
    - Reflection of attendance to two university-related events throughout the semester: (25 points)
    - Library Assignment: (25 points)
    - Rough Draft of Annotated Bibliography: (25 points)
    - Entering Student Program Feedback Survey: (25 points)
- **Blackboard Journal Posts: 150 points (6 Journal Posts worth 25 points each)**
  - Description of Blackboard Journal Posts:
    - Reflection over documentary viewed in class and articles from the “The Borderland and the Environment” reading packet
- **Attendance and Professionalism: 100 points**
  - Description of Attendance and Professionalism:
    - In order to be successful in University Seminar 1301, it is necessary to have good attendance. Part of this course includes learning to be successful in a university, and being responsible with your classes, attendance and punctuality.
    - Attendance (50 points):
      1. After being absent for four consecutive days, you will be dropped from the course.
      2. After being absent for more than three non-consecutive days, you will lose 50 points of the class participation and professionalism grade.
      3. After accumulating more than six absences (non-consecutive), you will be dropped from the course.
      4. Being late to class (5 minutes late or more), will count as a half-absence.
      5. Leaving class early will count as a half-absence.
      6. This policy refers to ALL kinds of absences.
      7. See instructor if you have extenuating circumstances regarding absences or missed work.
      8. University sanctioned travel with prior notice and proper documentation will be excused.
    - Cell Phone use and Professional Behavior in Class (50 points):
      1. Cell Phone use and Professionalism: Being present in class involves your full attention. While on the cell phone, students cannot give their undivided attention to the course lecture or activity. Inappropriate and excessive cell phone use, excessive socializing,

disrupting class, sleeping in class, lack of attentiveness, disrespect towards instructor, peer leader and/or others are some examples of behaviors that can cause this score to drop.

2. The instructor **AND** peer leader will determine this score at the end of the semester according to their own discretion.
- **Final annotated bibliography and presentation on research topic: 200 points**
    - Description of final research, annotated bibliography and presentation:
      - Final research and presentation on a specific course topic (100 points)
      - Annotated Bibliography on research topic APA style (100 points)
  - **Career Portfolio (professional development): 100 points**
    - Description of Career Portfolio:
      - A portfolio that will include short and long term goals, resume, *Choices* activity, attendance to Career Fair and Leadership component
  - **Final reflection essay: 50 points**
    - Reflective essay on specific course objectives
  - **Community Engagement Project (extra credit): 50 points**
    - Community Engagement Project with Miner Volunteer Corps
    - Students will have the opportunity to participate in a community project
    - Reflective essay and participation will amount to 50 extra points
  - **Grading Scale:**

## Course Policies:

### Late Assignment Policy:

- **Late assignments (with the exception of Blackboard chapter quizzes and discussion board posts) will lose points as follows:**

- **1.3.1 Scholastic Dishonesty (from the Handbook of Operating Procedures: Student Affairs)**
  - It is the official policy of the University that all suspected cases or acts of alleged scholastic dishonesty must be referred to the Dean of Students for investigation and appropriate disposition. It is the policy of the university not to administer a second final examination in the course. It is also university policy that students shall not have more than two final examinations in a single day. In the unlikely event that the examination schedule results in a student having three final examinations on a single day, the faculty member upon the request of the student shall reschedule the second of that student’s three examinations.
