Course Description

This university seminar course will lead the incoming freshman to learn about, analyze and research various topics related to the history and current status of the air, soil and water quality along the US-Mexico border area, focusing primarily on El Paso/Cd. Juarez. This course will emphasize critical thinking, research and effective written and oral communication whilst immersing students in opportunities for a successful university transition including student success strategies, effective career and advising guidance, and participation in community and college events.

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Course Goals

- Students will develop and apply elements of leadership through effective individual participation and meaningful team collaboration.
- Students will examine the roles and responsibilities crucial for their success in college and beyond.

- Students will engage in research and critical thinking activities that demonstrate their ability to effectively integrate their learning within, across, and beyond academic settings.

- Students will learn skills necessary to research an academic theme, prepare and conduct a presentation with their peers.

- Students will learn to assess and understand more about their own interests, abilities and values in order to realize their academic, career and life goals.
- Students will become involved in activities related to UTEP and also learn about the resources available to them through their campus.

Late Assignment Policy:

- **Late assignments (with the exception of Blackboard-related work) will lose points as follows:**
- On the same day (after the class on the day they are due): 5 points off
- One day late: 10 points off
- **After one day, late assignments will no longer be accepted**
- All non-online assignments are expected to be handed in class, printed out and stapled on the day they are due.

Attendance, Punctuality and Professionalism:

- **Attendance and Punctuality (100 points):**
- After being absent for four consecutive days, you will be dropped from the course (**Excessive absence**).
- After being absent for more than four non-consecutive days, you will lose 100 points of the attendance grade.
- After accumulating more than six absences (non-consecutive), you will be dropped from the course (**Excessive absence**).
- Being late to class (5 minutes late or more), will count as a half-absence.
- Leaving class early will count as a half-absence.
- This policy refers to ALL kinds of absences.
- Please schedule important appointments (such as doctor's appointments, etc.) outside of class time, as they will also count as absences.
- See instructor if you have extenuating circumstances regarding absences or missed work.
- University sanctioned travel with prior notice and proper documentation will be excused.
- **Professionalism (30 points):**

- Being present in class involves your full attention. While on the cell phone, students cannot give their undivided attention to the course lecture or activity. Inappropriate and excessive cell phone use, using any type of ear phone or ear bud, excessive socializing, disrupting class, sleeping in class, lack of attentiveness, disrespect towards instructor, peer leader and/or others are some examples of behaviors that can cause this score to drop.
- The peer leader will determine this score at the end of the semester according to his own discretion.

Neglect or lack of effort:

- Neglect or lack of effort are also reasons for being dropped from the course according to the Records and Registration Office and are defined in this course as the following:
- **Neglect:** no participation, not paying attention in class or caring about the course, may be combined with not attending class
- **Lack of effort:** not meeting course requirements, not submitting work, may be combined with not attending class

- **Copyright Statement:**

- Exemption from final examination may not be given. Final examinations are scheduled to be two hours, forty-five minutes in length and take place during the final examination period. It is the policy of the university not to administer a second final examination in the course. It is also university policy that students shall not have more than two final examinations in a single day. In the unlikely event that the examination schedule results in a student having three final examinations on a single day, the faculty member upon the request of the student shall reschedule the second of that student’s three examinations.
