Eating, Breathing and Beautifying Ourselves Sick Fall 2016

Course Description

We live in a world where environmental contamination is inevitable. However, we often don't think about how the food we eat, the beauty products and cleaning agents we use contaminate our bodies and our homes. Many would never imagine that those contaminants are what affect us most each day. In this course you will read, analyze and investigate about how we are affected by the food and products we buy in today's market. Also, you will learn about success strategies needed in order to be successful in college. Amongst those success strategies are effective time management, note-taking, exam preparation, critical thinking and reading, and career guidance, amongst others. Also, students will participate in UTEP and community events, thus helping them become part of the greater UTEP/El Paso community.

Materials

Borders: Crossing into Your Future University Seminar 1301 Textbook, Sixth Edition (University Bookstore), "Eating, Breathing and Beautifying Ourselves Sick" Article Reading Packet (will be posted on Blackboard for printout), a two-pocket folder, a 70-page one subject notebook, and a small stapler.

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Course Objectives

- Students will learn about and practice essential study skills needed to be successful in a university.
- Students will learn skills necessary to research an academic theme, prepare and conduct a presentation with their peers.
- Students will establish contacts with professors, university staff and other classmates to create a positive environment and support group.
- Students will learn to assess and understand more about their own interests, abilities and values in order to realize their academic, career and life goals.
- Students will become involved in activities related to UTEP and also learn about the resources available to them through their campus.

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Evaluation

The grading criteria for this course will consist of daily grades, Blackboard posts, class participation, a career portfolio and a final research presentation and annotated bibliography. Please see below for descriptions of each.

- **Daily grades (learning guides, oral presentations, attendance to at least one university-related event, and other daily class assignments and activities): 400 points (25 points each)**

 - Attendance to one university-related event throughout the semester (25 points):
 - There will be a Discussion Post on Blackboard in which students can post throughout the entire semester their experience at the UTEP-related activity
 - Post will be due on Dec. 2, 2016: the Discussion Post will close after that date
 - Library Assignment (25 points)
 - Rough Draft of Annotated Bibliography (25 points)
 - Entering Student Program Feedback Survey (25 points)
- **Blackboard Discussion Posts: 200 points (25 points each)**
 - Description of Blackboard Discussion Posts:
 - Summaries and posts over documentaries viewed in class and articles from the “Eating, Breathing and Beautifying Ourselves Sick” reading packet
- **Class Participation: 100 points**
 - Description of Class Participation:
 - Attendance is very important; therefore 100 points of your final grade will be on class participation. Please see attendance policy.
- **Final annotated bibliography and presentation on research topic: 200 points**
 - Description of final research, annotated bibliography and presentation:
 - Final research and presentation on a specific course topic (100 points)
 - Annotated Bibliography on research topic APA style (100 points)
- **Career Portfolio: 100 points**
 - Description of Career Portfolio:
 - A portfolio that will include short and long term goals, resume and *Choices* activity

Course Policies:

Attendance Policy:

- In order to be successful in University Seminar 1301, it is necessary to have good attendance. Part of this course includes learning to be successful in a university, and being responsible with your classes and attendance.
 1. After being absent for four consecutive days, you will be dropped from the course.
 2. After being absent for more than three non-consecutive days, you will lose 100 points of the class participation grade.
 3. After accumulating more than six absences (non-consecutive), you will be dropped from the course.
 4. Being late to class (5 minutes late or more), will count as a half-absence.
 5. Leaving class early will count as a half-absence.
 6. This policy refers to ALL kinds of absences
 7. See instructor if you have extenuating circumstances regarding absences or missed work.
 8. University sanctioned travel with prior notice and proper documentation will be excused.

Late Assignment Policy

- **Late assignments (with the exception of Blackboard chapter quizzes and discussion posts) will lose points as follows:**
 1. On the same day (after the class on the day they are due): 5 points off
 2. One day late: 10 points off
 3. After one day late assignments will no longer be accepted
 4. All assignments are expected to be handed in class, printed out and stapled on the day they are due.
- **Blackboard chapter quizzes and discussion posts WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED LATE**
 1. Blackboard discussion posts are due on Sundays by 11:59 pm (on the weeks that they are due).
 2. Chapter quizzes are due on Fridays by 9:00 am (on the weeks that they are due).
 3. If you did not post or take the quiz on time, the quiz/post closes and you can no longer take the quiz/post. You will receive a zero for that quiz/post.
 4. Please assure yourself that you have access to a desktop or laptop to successfully access Blackboard. Blackboard does not always work efficiently from tablets or phones.
 5. If you are having technical problems you need to contact the Helpdesk 747-5257 with enough time BEFORE the post is due. They cannot resolve your issues on time if you contact them **right before** the post is due.

- **1.3 Student Conduct (from the Handbook of Operating Procedures: Student Affairs)**

- **1.3.1 Scholastic Dishonesty (from the Handbook of Operating Procedures: Student Affairs)**
 - It is the official policy of the University that all suspected cases or acts of alleged scholastic dishonesty must be referred to the Dean of Students for investigation and appropriate disposition. It is contrary to University policy for a faculty member to assign a disciplinary grade such as an “F” or zero to an assignment, test, examination, or other course work as a sanction for admitted or suspected scholastic dishonesty in lieu of normally charging the student through the Dean of Students. - **1.3.12 Plagiarism (from the Handbook of Operating Procedures: Student Affairs)**
 - Plagiarism means the appropriation, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means another’s work and the unacknowledged submission or incorporation of it in one’s own academic work offered for credit, or using work in a paper or assignment for which the student had received credit in another course without direct permission of all involved instructors.

 - Except for changes that substantially affect the evaluation statement, this syllabus is a guide for the course and is subject to change with advance notice.
- **Policy for final exams (From the online Schedule of Classes)**
 - Exemption from final examination may not be given. Final examinations are scheduled to be two hours, forty-five minutes in length and take place during the final examination period. It is the policy of the university not

to administer a second final examination in the course. It is also university policy that students shall not have more than two final examinations in a single day. In the unlikely event that the examination schedule results in a student having three final examinations on a single day, the faculty member upon the request of the student shall reschedule the second of that student's three examinations.
