The quiz is found at the “QUIZZES” tab. The quiz consists of 10 questions. The untimed quiz may be taken as often as necessary to earn maximum points.

B.) Discussion Board (13 of 14)**20 pts each****Total 260 pts**

A **minimum** of three (3) posts are required within each discussion board forum. Initial posts are worth up to 15 points each. You must also reply to at least two others. Each reply post is worth up to 2.5 points. Posts must demonstrate an understanding of and objective application of terms and concepts in chapter readings. Posts must also address everything required by the prompt.

The lowest one (1) discussion grade is dropped.

C.) Chapter Quiz (12 of 13)**30 pts each****Total 360 pts**

Chapter quizzes will consist of 25 randomly selected multiple-choice and true/false questions each. You will have two (2) attempts and thirty (30) minutes to complete each quiz.

If taken, the result of the second attempt, even if lower than the first, will be recorded.

The lowest one (1) quiz grade is dropped.

D.) InQuizitive (14 of 15)**10 pts each****Total 140 pts**

InQuizitive is a formative, adaptive quizzing tool with gaming elements that improves student understanding of learning objectives. Each InQuizitive assignment may be accessed via the COURSE MATERIALS tab. The assignment must be accessed via our course in Blackboard in order for your grade to be recorded in the course.

The lowest one (1) InQuizitive grade is dropped.

E.) Exams (2)**120/110 pts each****Total 230 pts**

Exam 1 (chapters 1 – 7) will consist of 60 randomly selected questions. Exam 2 (chapters 8 – 13) will consist of 55 randomly selected questions. You will have two (2) attempts and seventy-five (75) minutes to complete each exam.

If taken, the result of the second attempt, even if lower than the first, will be recorded.
