Course Description: The purpose of this course is to teach students how to think critically about technology in relation to gender. This course will examine a wide range of issues related to the historical and contemporary representations of gender in relation to technology. We will study the relationships between new technologies, culture, identity and sexuality.

Class Philosophy: This course provides the student who takes it with a degree of flexibility that is unavailable in the traditional classroom setting. You choose when you read and answer discussion questions as long as your work is completed by the due date. In a very real sense, your learning is self-directed and self-motivated. What you take away from the course will in large measure be determined by how much time and effort you put into it.

I. Exams: Exams will consist of objective-style questions short answer and essays.

II. Assignments: The purpose of your weekly assignment is to build your own database of examples that illustrate, or contradict, the ideas found in the articles you're reading.

III. Discussions: Post an individual thread to the question and at least two responses. You are encouraged to post more responses. Discussion criteria, such as word counts will be posted on Blackboard. You are welcome to discuss asynchronously, which means at your convenience.

Due Deadline Policy: Discussion postings and assignments must be submitted by the specified time. **Late postings of assignments & discussions will not be accepted.** Discussions will be conducted -online. Questions will be provided to you that will guide your reading, focus your attention on the important elements of each work, and aid you in assessing these texts. The instructor will participate with replies to many, but not all, of your postings.

Participation in Discussions: Participation is a critical element in any Women's and Gender Studies course. When students share their experiences with the class, the course material often becomes more interesting and comprehensible.
