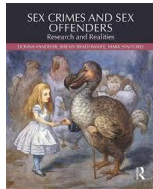

Course Description: CRIJ 4300-Special Topics: Sex Offenses is an upper division elective course in Criminal Justice, focusing on sex crimes, sex offenders, the criminal justice system, and policy. We will examine myths through a critical research and reality-based lens. The purpose of this course is to provide students with information that will benefit them when working with/studying such offenders. The course begins with an overview of the types of sex crimes that occur, along with their prevalence. Both criminological theories and theories specific to sex offending are identified and emphasis is placed on typologies, which emphasize the diversity that exists among sex offenders. Students will have the opportunity to explore problems with current trends and to discuss related issues. Emphasis is placed on disputing commonly held myths regarding this population of offenders.

Learning Goals and Objectives:

1. To be familiar with the factual information (fundamental principles) associated with sex offenders and sex offender research. Each student should be familiar with the following:
 - Number of and trends about sex offenders
 - History/background of sex/sex offender research
 - Theories related to sex crimes (biological, cognitive, psychosocial, etc.)
 - Types of sex crimes (rape, child sexual abuse, and child pornography)
 - Special populations of sex offenders (juvenile sex offenders, female sex offenders, and those who sexually abuse in the context of an institution)
2. To gain information about work with sex offenders. This includes the following:
 - Investigation approaches
 - Assessment and treatment approaches
 - Registration laws and government reaction

These objectives are achieved through various activities, including attending class, taking notes, reading assigned material, participating in class discussions, completing assignments, and preparing for exams.

Format of Class:

This is an online course. Students are expected to participate in all discussion boards, as this is how you demonstrate to me that you can apply the concepts covered in the lecture presentations. There are 3 exams in this class, which will cover the lecture material and assigned readings. It is important to log in several times throughout the week to keep up with discussions, any class updates. Complete all assignments on time, and most importantly, ask questions/clarification about anything that is unclear.

DETAILS OF COURSE REQUIREMENTS

I. Written Assignment

In weeks 3, 5 and 7, you will have a writing assignment due. The assignment will require you use to analyze and apply concepts we have covered in this class. In these assignments, I expect to see that you can apply material. **Refer to Blackboard for more information regarding your writing assignments.**

LATE ASSIGNMENTS

Due dates are posted in Blackboard. Plan accordingly. I do not accept late assignments. No exceptions.

II. Discussion boards

There are 8 discussion boards in this class. Your participation is required in all of them. Original posts are due by TUESDAY and must be 200 words in length. You must use at least 2 academic resources to support your opinion, unless otherwise stated in the discussion board. You must respond to 2 of your peers by Friday plus any of your peers that ask you questions by Sunday. **If you fail to respond to me if I ask you a question, you will receive only half of the credit possible plus any points taken from the grading rubric. Late discussions will not be accepted.**

III. EXAMS: You will have 2 exams in this class. Each exam is worth 50 points each (**SEE schedule for exam dates**)

- A. **The exact format of exams is to be determined.** However, the exams will likely be structured with some combination of Multiple choice, True/False, and/or Essay questions.
- B. **Missed Exams CANNOT be made up.**
