

<b>Course description:</b>	<p>Introduction to the role of nutrition in promoting, maintaining, and improving the health in the community. Includes nutritional studies of groups and community resources and programs providing nutritional services. Analysis of nutrition problems, and practices in the community with emphasis on underserved populations. Development of nutrition policy and legislation and ethical and legal issues in nutrition practice.</p>

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<b>Course Name:</b>	<b>Community Nutrition</b>
<b>Incomplete policy:</b>	<p>An “I” (incomplete grade) can be considered only if requested by the student in advance of the conclusion of the course and only for legitimate, documented <b>emergencies</b>. Failure to request and negotiate the terms of an “Incomplete” grade before the conclusion of the course will result in a denial except in the most extraordinary circumstances.</p> <p>Talk to the instructor immediately if you believe an incomplete is warranted. If granted, the instructor and student will establish a contract of work to be completed with deadlines.</p>
<b>Attendance and Participation:</b>	<p>It is expected that all students enrolled in <b>HSCI 3316 Community Nutrition</b> to participate in all instructional activities. Online courses are no different from classroom courses in regards to attendance. Participation is defined accordingly under assignment strategies. Students “attendance” on online courses is defined as active participation on the course as described in the course syllabus.</p> <p>Online courses will have, at minimum, weekly mechanism for student participation, which can be documented by any or all of the following methods:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Reading/viewing all course materials to ensure understanding of assignment requirements.</li> <li>2. Participating in engaging discussion with your peers on the discussion boards (grading rubric provided in the “grading information” area of each forum)</li> <li>3. Participating in scheduled Blackboard Collaborate sessions</li> <li>4. Other activities as indicated in the weekly modules</li> <li>5. Submission/completion of assignment and evaluations</li> <li>6. Communication with the instructor</li> </ol> <p>Students who do not log on to the course within the drop/add period for the course will be dropped from the course. Students who fail to maintain an active participation in an online course as defined in the course syllabus will be processed in accordance with the university’s current attendance policy.</p> <p><b>Other Attendance Policy:</b> Class participation is a <b>mandatory</b> component of this course. It is the student’s responsibility to get all assignments and/or class notes. Not knowing about an exam or assignment due date because lack of participation in the course is not a valid excuse.</p>
<b>Reading assignments &amp; Test Proctoring Software:</b>	<p>All assigned readings need to be completed prior to coming to the next scheduled class session. Example: the reading assignments for week 2 need to be completed prior to coming to the week 2 class session.</p> <p>Please review the following guidelines regarding testing:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The assessments will only be available at the times identified on the course calendar.</li> <li>• You may take the test at any time during the available time-frame window.</li> <li>• A reliable Internet connection is essential to completing the exam. If you must go to a location to take the exam (such as the library), be sure to follow their health and safety requirements.</li> <li>• You have two attempts to take the test. Once the window closes, your answers will be saved, and no changes can be made. The first score saved will be recorded.</li> </ul>



	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Respondus Lockdown Browser will require that all internet tabs are closed prior to the start of the test – only the final exam will be required to use this software.</li><li>• Respondus Monitor requires a webcam and microphone.</li><li>• You will be required to show the webcam your student ID prior to the start of the test.</li><li>• Your face should be completely visible during the test. Blocking the camera will disable the test.</li><li>• No notes or textbook materials are permitted during the test. Respondus Monitor requires you to take a video of your surrounding area (desk, chair, walls, etc.)</li><li>• You should not have conversations with other people and/or leave and return to the area during the test.</li></ul>
<b>Class recordings:</b>	<p>The use of recordings by your instructor will enable you to have access to class lectures and group discussions. - Possession and/or use during an exam or home test of materials which are not authorized by the person giving the test, such as class notes, books, or specifically designed “crib notes”;
