Identify the nutrition conditions and interventions through the life cycle</li><li>2. Understand the nutritional needs and changes of people in the various stages of life: pregnancy and lactation, infancy, childhood, adolescence, adulthood and aging</li><li>3. Identify the factors influencing normal growth and development in the different stages of life</li><li>4. Understand the influence of place and environment on the nutrition of people through the life cycle</li></ol>

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<p><b>Assessment strategies: (must be numbered)</b></p>	<p><b>Assessments</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>Case Studies</b> - There will be a total of 5 case studies assigned during the time of the course; each case study is due each week on Friday at midnight starting the second week of the semester. Specific late fee policy is described in Blackboard</li> <li>2. <b>On-line participation</b> - Will be assessed by the use of Blackboard - Students must log in into the course at least three times per week. Assessment will include but are not limited to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-<b>Blackboard Collaborative Ultra Session attendance:</b> Students must try to log in into at least one live session during the semester. Live sessions will occur every Monday.</li> <li>-<b>Blackboard assignments</b> including but not limited to: Initial assessment of the knowledge and interest of students, videos, crossword puzzles, etc.</li> </ul> </li> <li>3. <b>Quizzes</b>- A total of five quizzes related to specific topics will be available during week 2, 3, 4, 5 &amp; 6. Quizzes are due on Sunday at Midnight and there will be no make up quizzes. Students have three attempts to score the highest possible grade.</li> <li>4. <b>Final Project:</b> Everyone will be assigned a lifestage and students will complete a final project that is due during the last week of the semester. <b>Attendance:</b>	<p>It is expected that all students enrolled in <b><i>HSCI 3323 Nutrition Thru the LifeCycle</i></b> to participate in all instructional activities. Online courses are no different from classroom courses in regards to attendance. Participation must be defined accordingly. Students “attendance” on online courses will be defined as active participation on the course as described in the course syllabus. Student participation in overall course</li> <li>2. Student participation in discussion boards</li> <li>3. Submission/completion of assignment and evaluations</li> <li>4. Communication with the instructor</li> </ol> <p>Students who do not log on to the course within the drop/add period for the course will be dropped from the course. Students who fail to maintain an active participation in an online course as defined in the course syllabus will be processed in accordance with the university’s current attendance policy.</p> <p><b><u>Other Attendance Policy:</u></b> Class participation is a <b><u>mandatory</u></b> component of this course. It is the student’s responsibility to get all assignments and/or class notes. Not knowing about an exam or assignment due date because lack of participation in the course is not a valid excuse.</p>

another student during an exam or homework assignment, or giving aid to or seeking aid from another student during a test;

- Possession and/or use during an exam or home test of materials which are not authorized by the person giving the test, such as class notes, books, or specifically designed “crib notes”;
- Using, obtaining, or attempting to obtain by any means the whole or any part of non-administered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program; using a test that has been administered in prior classes or semesters but which will be used again either in whole or in part without permission of the instructor; or accessing a test bank without instructor permission;
- Collaborating with or seeking aid from another student for an assignment without authority;
- Substituting for another person, or permitting another person to substitute for one's self, to take a test;
- Falsifying research data, laboratory reports, and/or other records or academic work offered for credit.

**“Plagiarism”** means the appropriation, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any means another's work and the unacknowledged submission or incorporation of it in one's own academic work offered for credit, or using work in a paper or assignment for which the student had received credit in another course without direct permission of all involved instructors. NOTE: This includes cutting-and-pasting and photocopying from on-line and other material.
