Course Description

The course provides an in-depth study of financial accounting concepts, elements of financial statements, and preparation of financial reports.

Course Learning Objectives

After successfully completing this course, you will be able to record, analyze, and interpret historical and prospective financial and non-financial information in accordance with U.S. GAAP.

Course Delivery

This class is taught online in asynchronous format. All homework, quizzes, exams, and communication will be done using Blackboard, McGraw-Hill Connect, Respondus Lockdown Browser, and the UTEP email system. It is the student's responsibility to have a working computer equipped with a camera that allows them to perform the necessary functions of an online class. Students can go to the 3rd floor of the library to technical support to borrow computers. Not having a working computer or any computer issues will not be excused. While the class is asynchronous, there are deadlines, and no late work or exams are accepted.

Assignment (200 points)*SmartBook Reading Modules:*

For each chapter, you will complete a SmartBook reading module on the Connect website. Each module is worth 5 points. Each one will be closed just before midnight the day it is due. **No make-up modules will be given for any reason** – please plan accordingly.

Homework Problems:

For each chapter you will be asked to complete homework problems. Each homework problem assignment is worth 10 points and is open book. For each homework, you will have **2** attempts, and I take the **highest** score. Each homework closes just before midnight the day it is due. **No make-up homework assignments will be given for any reason** – please plan accordingly.

Quizzes

Ten (10) quizzes will be given throughout the semester. Each quiz is worth five points. The quiz is typically taken at the end of the class. **No make-up quizzes will be given for any reason** – please plan accordingly.

Online course evaluation for extra credit (max 5 points)

If at least **90%** of all students enrolled in your section at the end of the semester complete the UTEP course evaluation for the class, each student will receive 5 points. If less 90% but greater than 80%, it will be 4 points. Then 3, 2, and 1 point.

Test proctoring software

All quizzes and exams will be held remotely and will make use of Respondus Lock Down Browser and Respondus Monitor inside of Blackboard or McGraw-Hill Connect to promote academic integrity. You are encouraged to learn more about how to use these programs prior to the first test.
